BUSINESS PROCEDURE FOR ANNUAL MEETING

1. The Annual General Meeting is conducted in accordance with our Constitution and By-Laws. In the case of any procedural dispute, reference shall be made to Parliamentary Procedures which is based on Robert's "Rules of Order".
2. Each Local Association may have five voting delegates, but all members can attend.
3. Each voting delegate shall have one vote provided their Association Membership Fees have been paid to PEIHSF by the Annual Meeting date. Each member of the Federation's Executive and Board of Directors shall also be entitled to one vote.
4. Voting shall be by ballot or show of hands. All questions shall be decided by a majority of those voting, except those which require two-thirds (2/3) majority; the President having a deciding vote in case of a tie.
5. A delegate speaking from the floor shall address the Chair and wait to be recognized. When a sound system is being used, delegates should proceed to a microphone, then wait until the Chair indicates it is your turn to speak.
6. A delegate may not speak for more than two minutes on any question under discussion, not more than once on the same question unless requested or permitted by the Chair to clarify a point. However, the mover of a motion or resolution shall have the privilege of speaking first to begin discussion and speaking last to close debate on the question.

MEETING TIPS

1. Plan to enjoy the meetings. As a representative of your Association, it is your responsibility to help make it a success.
2. This is YOUR Annual Meeting - YOU transact the business of the Federation and set the policy to be followed in the coming year for the PEIHSF.
3. Be courteous to speakers by listening attentively. Avoid private conversations and remain seated when others are speaking.
4. Speaking from the floor - a member wishing to speak from the floor shall address the Chair, give their name in full and the name of the Association represented.
5. Do find time to exchange ideas and information. Be friendly, mix with delegates from other parts of the province. Don't wait for them to speak first. They may also be a bit shy and a first-time delegate to an Annual Meeting.
6. Say "hello" to your Board of Directors. They are elected to represent you between Annual Meetings by the Local Association members and they would like to meet you personally.

7. Do take notes in order that you may report back to your Association the action taken, business transacted, ideas and inspirations gained. Share info with your members - knowledge, hand-outs and other material acquired during the Annual Meeting.

3. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Wendy MacDonald, President, reports how fortunate she is to have a good board. Bill Whelan, Vice will be assuming the chair at the end of her term.

Parent Engagement - Wendy began her term with responsibilities regarding Parent Engagement, mandated by the Minister of Education. Funding was available but thought process had to be clarified. This application was submitted and approved this week and includes a telephone survey which will give ideas on how parents are involved; a survey of best practices and ideas to share among schools. The strategy isn't all research. We hope to develop 10-12 pilots throughout schools with a hope there will be funding to carry out projects. Our hope is to create a more

positive environment for parents to become involved in Home and School and guidelines around fund-raising. An exciting year!

VolNet - The Federation applied for and received funding from the Volunteerism Network (VolNet). In January, Focus Groups were organized which provided feedback regarding Parent Engagement. School surveys were part of process to measure parent issues.

Substance Abuse - The Canadian Home & School Federation was funded by Health Canada to carry out a National Substance Abuse Prevention project. Thank you to Georgina Allen for her leadership in this project. The aim was to offer factual information on this issue to parents across Canada. Professionals such as RCMP, Addictions Counsellors, City Police, and Pharmacists were asked to present info at school-based sessions. Thank you to members for getting people involved at the local school level. This was a great learning experience.

Resolution 1/07 Fundraising Guidelines
Submitted by PEI Home and School Federation

- WHEREAS many Home and Schools Associations carry out fundraising to enhance the school environment, enrich learning, and support children's healthy development and well-being; and
- WHEREAS significant variations exist among schools in the processes for priority-setting, handling, and accountability for use of funds raised by Home and School Associations; and
- WHEREAS Home and School Associations are often approached by their schools to assist in funding basic and core items such as equipment, supplies, books, etc., and
- WHEREAS elementary and secondary education is publicly funded, and materials pertaining to curriculum should be covered by the school budget rather than by funds raised by parent groups; and
- WHEREAS the PEI Home and School Federation frequently receives queries from local associations, schools, and school boards regarding fundraising issues; and
- WHEREAS clear guidelines can contribute to a more positive partnership between schools and parent groups;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation be mandated to consult with local associations and with the Eastern School District and the Western School Board, and develop Federation guidelines to support local associations in their fund-raising activities, for submission at the 2008 AGM.

- WHEREAS Home and School members and other volunteers support schools in a range of ways, such as assisting in the classroom, supervising field trips, helping with events, running safe arrival programs, providing nutritious meals and snacks, and many other activities; and
- WHEREAS it is a goal of the Home and School Federation to promote and facilitate all forms of parent involvement in education; and

WHEREAS volunteer activities reside under the direction of the administration of individual schools and consultations indicate that current roles and procedures vary widely among schools;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation be mandated to carry out research on volunteer policies, and to consult with local associations and with the Eastern School District and the Western School Board to promote development of Board policies which encourage much-needed volunteer involvement while at the same time ensuring the safety and well-being of children.

The past year has been a positive and exciting one for the PEI Home and School Federation as we began to implement our strategy to increase parental involvement in their children's learning, and to foster a more positive environment for parent involvement in education. We work to serve parents of school aged children in PEI through our mandate to pursue, "the total well-being of children and the highest standards of education for each child in the province." This year, we are proud to represent almost 11,000 parents at 48 schools. We are recognized as an official partner in education and the voice for parents in PEI's English language schools on issues related to students' learning and well-being.

In the April 2007 Budget, the Federation was awarded a grant of \$50,000 to support the first phase of its work to develop a strategy to increase parent involvement in learning, and this funding was confirmed by our new government in the fall Budget. This funding has enabled the Federation to move forward with a range of school-based pilot projects and other exciting initiatives. To guide and focus this work, the PEIHSF has adopted an eight-point definition of parent involvement which builds on the strengths of the involvement that already exists. The framework identifies four ways in which parents are involved with the education of their own children, and four ways in which parents are more broadly involved in the life of their school and in supporting the education system

We believe that the vast majority of parents are already involved with their own children's education, by:

- Parenting - raising healthy, happy children, and sending them to school well rested, well fed, and feeling loved and good about themselves.
- Communicating - with the child's teacher and with the school.
- Learning at home - supporting the school curriculum through homework and other means, and even more importantly, teaching "life's lessons" in terms of values, character, life skills, social skills, and communications skills.
- Celebrating the child's achievements by attending school events such as concerts, plays, science and heritage fairs, art expos, and sporting events.

In addition, many parents also take part in and contribute to their child's school community, by:

- Fundraising - providing resources to enrich the school's environment and activities, and helping provide access to opportunities for all children.
- Volunteering - helping in the classroom, the lunchroom, the playground, at events and on trips.

- Decision-making - taking part in local and provincial parent associations, connecting with education partners, and advocating for change.
- Partnering - bringing resources and support from other community organizations to the school.

The challenge facing PEIHSF is to build on this involvement and help more parents to become more involved in more ways. To achieve this, work is moving forward on many fronts.

Parenting To support parents in their parenting role and to promote the health and well-being of children, the Federation is involved in a number of provincial partnerships – including the Healthy Eating Alliance, the Active Living Alliance, the PEI Tobacco Reduction Alliance, and various special projects and initiatives. Most recently, the Federation has been asked to sit on the Advisory Committee on the Youth Addictions Strategy, in recognition of its past work to promote drug awareness and drug education among parents. At the AGM, delegates will be provided with information on *Parenting the Net Generation*, an Internet safety workshop designed for parents by the Media Awareness Network in partnership with the Canadian Home and School Federation. The Federation is also placing more emphasis on promoting physical activity, and will be following up on its policy resolution and AGM speaker on issues of respect and inclusion in sport.

Communicating Good communications are the foundation of parent involvement at all levels. The education system is making progress on communicating to individual parents about their child’s academic achievement, school participation, and well-being, also the subject of an AGM presentation. At the provincial level, the Federation is the voice of parents within the education system. We work to fulfill this vital responsibility in many ways – our monthly newspaper column, our interaction with the media on education issues, our liaison with other partners in education, our policy resolutions to bring forward parents’ issues and priorities, and our awards to communicate to the public and to the school system the qualities that we value in staff. To strengthen this role, we have developed a new logo and visual identity to freshen our “look.” As well, we are renewing and expanding our website to make it a daily go-to resource and meeting place for parents and parent groups.

Learning To support learning at home, PEIHSF is working with Learning and Reading Partners to hold up to twelve parent support pilots in schools across PEI. Based on feedback from parent groups and schools in the spring of 2007, a number of exciting pilot projects are underway in schools across PEI. In February 2008, almost twenty parents from ten schools met and shared their plans, experiences, ideas, and hopes for these pilot projects.

- Queen Charlotte’s Parent Learning Club is connecting immigrant parents with Island parents to develop language skills and familiarize newcomer parents with the school system.
- At Sherwood Elementary, parent information sessions are in progress and a video is being developed demonstrating best practices in parent reading.
- Belfast Consolidated’s project will involve games evenings to build awareness of the learning that can happen when parents and children play board games, cards, and other activities.

- St. Teresa's is planning math workshops for parents and developing a math dictionary for parents.
- Gulf Shore Consolidated and Glen Stewart Consolidated are planning information sessions on topics of priority interest to parents.
- Tignish Consolidated, Kensington Intermediate and Senior High, Donagh, and Rollo Bay are developing projects to increase parent and volunteer involvement.
- Several other schools are in earlier stages of project planning.

Thanks go to Mait MacIsaac and Sandy Rendall of Learning and Reading Partners for their commitment to empowering parents, and their leadership in facilitating and supporting these pilots. Findings from the pilots will be used to promote expansion of parent support programs in future years. In addition to these pilots, PEIHSF has offered to assist parent groups with school-level initiatives, and to help them tap funding for larger projects.

As well, this year, the Federation has expanded its awards for children's learning to include the science fair projects from the Eastern and Western School Boards which best explore topics related to children's learning, health, or safety. This adds to the awards for best family-related projects in the Heritage Fair, established in 2006. At the Provincial Science Fair on April 3, in addition to the winners' awards, the Federation also provided "science in a suitcase" kits for use in school or at home, to the winners' schools. Thanks go to the Union of Public Sector Employees for its sponsorship of these awards.

Fundraising Although fundraising can be a positive way to involve parents and to help the school, money issues can undermine relationships between schools and parents. In October 2007, the Minister of Education announced at the Teachers Federation annual convention that his government was committed to eliminate school fees, affirming a commitment made during the May 2007 election. This important announcement responds to parent concerns and to a resolution at PEIHSF's 2006 AGM calling for a policy on school fees. While the Federation welcomes this commitment, it holds the potential to put further support on parent groups to fundraise for items that schools cannot or will not cover out of their core funding. To address this, PEIHSF will continue to press for adequate funding for schools, and to work on a policy on fundraising to guide and support local associations in their interactions with the school, as mandated by a resolution at the 2007 AGM.

Volunteering Volunteer involvement in the schools, although important and welcomed, is not currently supported by any policies in PEI. Focus groups by PEIHSF in early 2007 indicated a wide range of practices in schools across PEI. Events in other organizations and service systems have clearly shown that policies are needed to ensure the safety and protection of the children, and also of volunteers. Also mandated by a resolution at the 2007 AGM, the Federation has worked to research and develop policy in this area for discussion with the Department and school boards. A policy resolution is being submitted to the 2008 AGM calling for stronger certification requirements for volunteer coaches to promote respectful and inclusive behavior in school sports.

Advising and Advocating Strengthening and supporting local associations has been a major priority for the Federation:

- In September 2007, with funding support secured from the Community Foundation of PEI, executive training sessions were provided to members of Home and School currently in or

considering executive roles. Almost thirty members attended the sessions, held at Parkside and Glen Stewart Schools, and gave high ratings to the information, ideas, and tools presented by workshop leaders Vicki Bryanton and Stephen Gould on the roles of president and treasurer. It is hoped to make these workshops an annual event.

- Local by-laws have been developed for consideration by local associations, drawing on a model developed by the Nova Scotia Federation of Home and School Associations. A copy of these is contained in the Book of Reports for reference. Locals are urged to review these, adapt them as needed, and adopt them, as they can help prevent problems in the day to day operations of locals, and quickly resolve issues that do arise.
- Future priorities include clarifying the issue of parent advisory councils, and their relationship to Home and School, and promoting the greater involvement of local parent groups in their schools' development planning process.

Partnering To expand its recognition and celebration of teachers and staff, the Federation established its Bus Driver Award in 2006. This year, the award was moved to Bus Safety Week, during October 2007, and garnered a number of great nominations. The awards were given to Ned Crossman of St. Peters School and Donna Campbell of Bloomfield Elementary. As well, Teacher and Staff Appreciation Week in February 2008 marked the fourth annual Extra Mile Awards, awarded to a teacher or staff person who "goes the extra mile" to make a difference in the lives of students and help them to develop, achieve, and succeed. Bonnie Rogerson of Kinkora High School was recognized for her teaching of agriculture and science in ways that built her students' awareness of ecological and global issues, while Sylvia Henderson, Language Arts resource teacher at Stone Park Intermediate School in Charlottetown, was recognized for her "genuine caring and deep affection for students with special needs."

In closing, my thanks go to my Board, to my colleagues who have offered to further serve on the Executive, and especially to our members of the Board and Executive who have completed their terms, for all their work and their many contributions during their time with the Federation.

PARENT ENGAGEMENT INITIATIVE UPDATE, April 2008
Bill Whelan, Vice President

In response to the recommendations by the Task Force on Student Achievement, the Minister of Education asked the Prince Edward Island Home and School Federation (HSF) to lead the development of a province-wide Parental Engagement (PE) Initiative. This request represents a strong endorsement of Home and School Associations by the provincial government and recognizes our emerging role as a learning and teaching partner in the education system on Prince Edward Island. The overall vision of the PE initiative is to establish collaborative home and school learning environments for our children so that they can succeed as individuals, as students and as citizens.

In May 2007, Wendy MacDonald, HSF President, circulated a survey to principals and local presidents to gather information on the current nature and extent of parent involvement, so as to learn about effective approaches/activities that are already underway and to identify needs and priorities. Twenty-five responses were received which included suggestions for parental engagement topics/activities. To complement the activities already underway, the HSF entered into a partnership with Learning and Reading Partners - LRP (Mait MacIsaac and Sandra Rendell) to design supports for parent involvement in learning and to launch a pilot program in 10 Island schools. LRP has extensive experience in literacy, parent program development and community engagement. The initial survey responses were consolidated into six topics for schools to consider.

Training Parents as School Volunteers

- * parent volunteers as learning partners in the school

Immigrant Parents Understanding the School System

- * parents helping immigrant parents in the school

Parents and the School Curriculum

- * helping parents understand the school curriculum so that they can better assist their children with school learning and assignments

Father Engagement

- * fathers working on strategies to assist their child with reading development

Family Math

- * parents working on strategies to assist their child with math/numeracy

Professional Development for Parents

- * parents learning about various topics to help them better understand how their children learn

In September 2007, these options were communicated to local Home and School presidents and school principals, who were asked to work together to identify a topic of greatest interest. Twelve schools responded and were enrolled in the pilot program. For the past 6 months Mait MacIsaac and Sandy Rendell have criss-crossed PEI, working with Home and School associations, teachers and principals at each of the Partners in Learning (PIL) pilot sites to develop and launch their parental engagement activities based on a collaborative team approach. In addition, Mait and Sandy along with the HSF organized a well-attended planning session on February 20th for H&S presidents, parents, school principals and school staff from the PIL sites. The purpose of this get together was to provide an opportunity for the leaders at the individual PIL sites to share experiences/stories, to support one another and to establish the beginnings of a province-wide network for parental engagement.

The following table outlines the schools participating in the PIL pilot projects and the activities that are developing. The sites are at different stages of implementation. These activities represent Phase I of the Parental

Engagement Initiative. The HSF is now seeking funding from the provincial government for Phase II which will look to expand the initiative to further develop projects already underway and to include more schools. So stay tuned!

1. Grade 9 Social Studies Update - Bethany Doiron

The grade 9 program is currently in a “renewal” stage. This is a transition year as we move toward a new curriculum; Interim curriculum plan developed

Other resources to be highlighted during in-service

The overarching theme for the grade 9 year is “Interdependence.” Students will examine issues, impacts, and other realities related to the concept of “interdependence”

Teachers will continue to use current curriculum guide and resources.

The “Evolving Identity” Booklet is a supplementary resource that was originally created for the new grade 8 “Canadian Identity” social studies program

2. CIT Update - Bruce Brine and Greg Bungay

Dept. Education CIT wanting to provide similar model to Montague Intermediate where Tech program does not utilize computer lab equipment; using refurbished computers from Computer For Schools program.. Integration is being encouraged wherever possible

3. Grade 9 Mathematics Assessment - Cindy Woods

16 grade 9 teachers and board reps worked on creating a fair assessment for the students 1,535 English students, 110 French students, 170 exempted wrote the assessment, an alternative form used in one school; 62 questions, paper & pencil test only

Teachers are very positive....said they’re ready for this, believe it is important

Dissemination of 2007 results = School Boards June 20th; Schools June 20th; Teachers June 20th, 21st; Students & Parents June 26th; Results are similar to ESD assessment

Now bringing in grades 7,8,9 teachers to develop this year’s test

Question of “teaching to the test”.....different questions will be used each time; this assessment helps teachers identify problem areas to help students

June 12, 2008 is date for this year’s test day; teachers will score their assessments in classroom which is worth 10%; they will send results to the Dept. Ed to do the centralized scoring in July; teachers are given their school results, board score and provincial score

4. Student Services Language Arts - Jarmo Puiras

Reading and Writing Achievement Standards (CAMET) - These standards are meant to help educators have a common understanding of reasonable expectations for reading and writing at the end of each grade level.

5. Health - Lori MacPherson

Grade 8 Sexual Health Outcomes for students were reviewed.

ELEMENTARY HEALTH STANDING COMMITTEE

The Elementary Health Curriculum Committee is working on Grades 4, 5, and 6. At the February 28/08 meeting, we reviewed resource books for the curriculum and added reference notes to the outcomes. There is no current text book available so we looked at two American books and our present Canadian book (last edition 1990!!!)

Lori MacPherson, Department of Education Health/Physical Education Specialist is the chair of this standing committee. She is trying to find better text books. They hope to Pilot the grades 4, 5, 6 health curriculum this spring and launch it in September 2008. But if there is a good book going to be published over the summer then they will pilot in the fall and launch in January. There was one textbook we all seemed to agree was the best of what was there. The publisher may be able to omit any "American" content pages. An example is that one book had a Spanish glossary. I really enjoy this committee.

MINISTER'S ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON
COMMUNICATIONS AND INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

The Department of Education through its Strategic Plan on Communications and Information Technology (CIT) (available on their website www.gov.pe.ca/educ) has been launching new initiatives to make computers and information technology an integral part of the PEI public school system, contributing to student learning outcomes in grades 1-12. Over the past year, the committee met on May 28, October 12 and February 8 to discuss a number of issues including the following items of direct interest to Home and School:

Internet Safety: There is an excellent internet safety resource for parents, created by the RCMP and other police forces, called Welcome to the Internet 101 (www.internet101.ca).

Information / Research Databases: An internet resource is available to help students research Science Fair and Heritage Fair projects (search.ebscohost.com). A username and password is required which you can get from B. Whelan.

Instructional Websites: The internet site (www.pageflakes.com) <http://www.pageflakes.com> is being used by teachers as an in-class instructional tool. Teachers and students can develop homepages that link to web based educational material (i.e. newspapers, weather, satellite images).

Home and School Associations are encouraged to interact with teachers, school Technology Committees, parents and students to support and promote the integration of technology-based

SPECIAL EDUCATION AND STUDENT SERVICES STANDING COMMITTEE
DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

This committee met on November 22/07 and March 7/08 with Peter Meggs, Department of Education as Chair. The following is an overview of meeting presentations/discussion.

4. M.Ed in Inclusive Education
New Masters Program at UPEI; material has been distributed to educators; 22 students will be accepted into the program; deadline January 15/08; begins summer 2008 with graduation May 2011
2. Resource Credit
Resource Credit (RES 401, 501, 601) is offered in high schools; students must be recommended for this credit, and can only receive one credit per year
3. Primary Intervention Program & Other Francophone Initiatives
Primary Intervention Program (PIP) started last year as a pilot program; the model comes from a grade 7 class in Fredericton, NB; Four students are selected for intensive intervention for 20 to 25 consecutive days; pretests and post-tests are administered; another group of students is selected at the end of the 25 days.
4. Autism Update
120 researchers, teachers, parents and clinicians attended Autism Research Symposium
All studies failed to connect vaccinations with autism; in spite of this fact, 54% parents still believe it is a cause; Alternate treatments used; caution regarding special diets
Research gaps regarding intervention, more students being identified in schools, varied provincial approaches, the need for trained professionals, calls for universal screening
Some students have aspergers, not autism; website info: www.aap.org
No evidence or research that states autism is epidemic...not even a significant increase!
5. Community Access Facilitator
Working on Transitions with Special Needs children, new position began October 1...
transition to community; Working on Transitions binder for Secondary Students; Need to create a directory of services for individuals with special needs
6. Provincial Literacy Assessments
Review Provincial Literacy Assessments for grades 3 and 6 in the Spring; discussion about students on adapted and modified programs, and other students who might fall under the exemption criteria, or be in need of partial exemptions - adaptation cannot lower expectation
7. Discussion on Students with Multiple Handicaps
Problems exist for multiply-handicapped students in rural communities, and the limited options in place in all settings for students with complex needs; Need for a coordinator to

oversee the delivery of disability services in the province. ESD has created a new position (Student Attendant) at a few schools for the care of the physical needs of students; need for better services for multiple-handicapped individuals.

8. UPEI Adult Connections in Education (ACE) program
 - ACE is an inclusive post-secondary education program for students with intellectual disabilities. It stipulates that the ACE Program is “committed to improving a student’s quality of life through the development of literacy, social and life skills to increase self-awareness, independence and employment in an inclusive environment.”
 - ACE is a 4-year program, 12 months a year, including two semesters of University classes and activities (Sept.-May) and a semester of employed or volunteer work experience (May-August).
9. Update on Kurzweil Textbook, CD’s
 - Student textbooks and other material need to be accessible, and on the Department website. Everything new should be in e-text and available on the website. However, this could raise copyright issues with publishers. The use of memory sticks is another option.
10. Update on the M.Ed. in Inclusive Education
 - Carla mentioned that the University received many applications for the Masters Program in Inclusive. The Literacy course from the Certificate in Inclusive Education will still be offered. The Faculty of Education has a new Dean: Dr. Tim Goddard, also three new professors, one in Math, one in Language Arts and one for Leadership. Carla mentioned her presentation at UPEI on research on adults with Learning Disabilities trying to access UPEI and Holland College.
 - Marie-Jacquard asked if the University could offer a course on Assessment in French. The University needs 20 people and a French-speaking instructor to offer the course.
11. High School Literacy Initiatives
 - Clayton Coe from the Department distributed a list of courses of Resource and English.
 - Resource credit information and options for literacy initiatives have been assembled.
 - WSB Counsellor’s Issues - Margie Cain
 - It was suggested that the allocation of staff for the Boards not be included in the Staffing Model formula.
 - UPEI should also focus on Special Ed. in the B.Ed. Program.

Partners in Learning:

- Our school principal, Derek McEwen, and I met with Sandy Rendell to begin planning for our Partners in Learning initiative and Mr. McEwen attended the recent workshop with several teachers. We are in the process of forming a committee to launch a Games Night for students in grades 1 to 6, along with their parents. This pilot project would involve parents and children in a evening of games set up, initially, by the teachers to show how learning can take place in a fun environment. The games night could be held at regular intervals, with a different subject as the theme each time (e.g. math games, word games, geography/map games.) Hopefully, parents will take home some of the ideas to use at home or even develop their own fun ways of learning. The main focus will be that learning is an ongoing process that happens in all settings, not just school, and that it can be enjoyable. The project is not intended to make parents into teachers, but to allow parents to spend more time with their children in a fun, stress-free environment. The benefit to the children should be two-fold: more time together with family and increased learning

Lunch Program:

- As nearly all our students are bussed to school, a breakfast program is not practical, but we do have a hot lunch program every day, serving healthy choices such as baked potatoes, chili, soup, chicken strips, and burgers, along with salads, fresh fruit, carrot sticks, and milk. The menu changes from time to time as some items gain in popularity (e.g. chili in the winter, salads during warm months.)

Teacher/Staff Appreciation Week:

Lunch and Snack Program:

Our snack and lunch program continues to succeed and expand at Englewood. We are into our fourth year. Monday, Wednesday and Fridays we offer hot lunches for \$2 that and has seen the selection grow each year. On Tuesdays and Thursdays we offer fruit and vegetable trays (free) that include a selection of 3 items (varying each week) plus cheese pieces.

The canteen has expanded its healthy snack selection for purchase and includes homemade muffins/ cookies (donated by parents), bottled water and 100% pure juice boxes. The sub provider will supplies subs without processed meats. Last year we instituted “lunch coupon sheets” – parents can buy a sheet of 20 or 40 coupons – it alleviates having to have change and is less work for the committee.

We continue to get wonderful support from the businesses in the community (money donations); farmers (donating potatoes), and community members who volunteer to prepare the trays for classroom delivery. We have upwards of a hundred parents volunteering – baking, cutting for trays, shopping, etc.

Teacher/Staff Appreciation Week:

All are recognized: Teachers, Bus Drivers, Custodians, Project L.O.V.E. volunteers, Library volunteers, Tutors, Teacher Assistants, Secretary, etc. Activities include a food item each day (Breakfast fruit, Breakfast muffins) and two days of a hot lunch and full courses! Special Events include:

Queen Charlotte Intermediate School Home and School reactivated in November 2006. At that time, it was determined to form an executive, hold regular meetings, communicate closely with school administration and student's council and join the PEI Home and School Federation. The activities that we have undertaken include:

Parent Volunteer Survey – Staff identified a number of areas where parent volunteers would be welcomed.. Parents were invited to complete a survey indicating their interests and availability. The survey results have been utilized to arrange volunteers for various school activities.

Meet the Teacher – Home and School volunteers baked and served muffins to encourage volunteers for the Breakfast Club. We also sold light bulbs that evening.

Teacher/Staff Appreciation Luncheon – Home and School organized and hosted a lovely lasagna & dessert buffet for all school staff in February. This event was very well supported by parent volunteers and greatly appreciated by staff.

Winter Carnival – In cooperation with Student's Council and school staff, Home and School host a Pancake Breakfast for the school community in March.

Fund-raising – QCIS Home and School sold CF Light bulbs within the school community. Funds raised have gone to support the Breakfast Club.

QCIS Parent Language Learning Club – A new initiative, in partnership with PEI Home and School Federation, is the establishment of a project to help immigrant parents become more familiar with the school, school community and to facilitate opportunities to speak English. All newcomer parents have been invited to participate in the organizing as well as the activities. There have been four gatherings (two organizing meetings, Asian cooking demonstration, wood craft class) with more planned. All members of the school community are welcome and encouraged to attend.

Breakfast Club – This is the most ambitious project of QCIS Home and School. Home and School hosted Charmaine Campbell of the Healthy Eating Alliance to discuss the establishment of a breakfast program at QCIS. Home and School volunteers organized and staffed a pilot program in April and May 2007. The QCIS Breakfast Club is up and running and serving a healthy

breakfast and good cheer to the students. Operations began in October, just after Thanksgiving, under the cheerful and organized leadership of volunteer Coordinator, Sue MacDonald. The program operates three mornings per week October – January, April - May and five mornings a week February – March. Following is a highlight list of the program:

- On average, daily we serve 60-80 students a serving of bagel, toast and juice. We serve 80-100 cups of 100% juice and 5 pounds of fresh fruit.
To date, we have had 24 parents/family members volunteer.
- One morning a group of parents prepared and served a selection of Korean foods. The food was delicious and well received by students and staff.
- Mark Kelly, QCIS teacher, supports the program by having a rotation of his homeroom students assist with cleanup. Approximately 12 students participate regularly.
- Anne Francis, parent volunteer, is assisting with coordinating the volunteer schedule; Great Canadian Bagel continues to be a generous supporter of the program, donating bagels every week.
- Ian and Cyrilla Saunders, QCIS parents, have been generous supporters of the program with donations of waffle making equipment, a toaster as well as food supplies. Ian regularly volunteers at the program as well.
- During this reporting period the program has spent \$746.21 on food and supplies. We have spent \$23.32/day and we had budgeted \$30.00. This amount brings us under budget by an average of \$6.68/day. Congratulations to Coordinator Sue MacDonald for doing an excellent job of keeping things on track!

School Clothing Sales – In cooperation with school staff and Student’s Council Home and School have assisted in arranging for the sale of crested sweaters, t-shirts and pants. Proceeds will go to support school activities.

Green Space Project – Home and School have been active in supporting the development of a Green Space on school grounds.

Traffic Concerns – Home and School have supported the school Administration’s efforts to have traffic flow concerns in the Simmons Arena parking lot and along North River Road addressed by writing letters of support to City of Charlottetown officials and maintaining regular communication with school and city officials. We are pleased that the parties were able to work together to design and implement a plan, which has addressed the majority of the concerns.

Communication – The Home and School executive have maintained regular communication with school administration through regular executive meetings, frequent e-mail and telephone communications and scheduled Home and School meetings. The school administration has facilitated our communication with other parents by publishing items in the monthly school newsletter, making announcements in the school and establishing a page on the school website for Home and School news.

School Development – Principal Jean Boudreau prepared and delivered a report on the progress of School Development issues to a meeting of the QCIS Home and School

We are pleased with the progress we have made in establishing a positive working relationship with administration, staff and students. We appreciate the support of the school administration and staff to help Home and School become active again at QCIS.

2. Parent Engagement

In an effort to create a greater sense of community at the school and increase parent engagement with the Home and School Association we undertook the following initiatives:

- Scheduled meetings once a month on the same day, i.e. the first Wednesday of every month. Principal or Vice Principal and at least two teachers – different ones each time – attend the meetings. Having teachers attend really opens up the communications channel.
- The Executive came up with a plan for activities for the year and based on that plan we created a number of committees and positions.
- Created a Communications Officer position on the Executive. We were fortunate to recruit an enthusiastic, dedicated and talented parent to take on this role. The Communications Officer has created special Home and School newsletters to get the word out to parents and teachers about the association, promote specific events and to respond to requests for information, for example, about the food program. She also has increased our presence on the School website. The Association has its own link on the site and the website administrator kindly posts our changes to our site. The communication officer also contributes a section to the bi-weekly school newsletter.
- Created a Volunteer Coordinator position. Again one of our parents who is a whiz with databases agreed to become the volunteer coordinator. She created a database based on the Grade One parents who signed up at orientation last June, the volunteer list from last year, and volunteer sign-up sheets for the specific volunteer opportunities that flow from the annual plan. Creating this database and giving the responsibility to one person has facilitated our volunteer recruitment efforts.
- Set up a table during the October parent/teacher interviews to get the word out about the Association, promote our upcoming activities and solicit volunteers for specific activities/events.

3. Policy Resolutions/By-laws

- We have not submitted any resolutions. This has largely been because no one has had the time to turn their attention to this matter and not because we don't want to see changes made by the Department of Education.
- We currently are not guided by a set of by-laws; however, we have begun work in this area and hope to see something adopted this spring to guide the Association going forward.

4. Lunch Program

- Opportunity to purchase a healthy lunch every day but Thursday.
- A hot lunch is available 3 of the 4 days.
- Menu adheres to the Healthy Eating Alliance guidelines.
- Program could not happen without the commitment and cooperation of our teaching staff.
- Each Monday morning students bring in their orders and payment for the week. Teachers collect the orders and designate a student to take the orders and money to the office.
- Food program coordinator organizes parent volunteers to count the money and tally the orders.
- School secretaries phone in the orders to the vendors.
- The Home and School Treasurer picks up the money and makes the bank deposit.
- The lunch program is a well-oiled machine ; it serves the needs of students and parents, and is an excellent revenue source for the Home and School Association.

5. Safe Arrival Program

- This program has been in operation for at least six years.
- Parents call in to leave a message on the Safe Arrival Line voice mail if their child will NOT be in school that day or will be arriving late.
- Our safe arrival coordinator schedules parents to come to the school each morning to check the Safe Arrival Line voice mail.
- If a parent has not left a message and his/her child does not arrive at school the volunteer calls the parent to inform them.

6. Fund-raising

In our plan for 2007-2008, we determined the Library Revitalization Project would receive the bulk of the proceeds from our fund-raising efforts.

Parents donated gently used items to be sold to the students for .50, \$1 or \$2

Gift wrapping was provided

Result: students left the Christmas Shoppe with specially wrapped gifts they chose and bought. A huge success, especially for its first year.

Money raised was a by-product, not the purpose. Donated to the Food Bank.

This year our new gym instructor initiated a Grade 6 Leadership class so we have helped them out with T-shirts, Christmas pizza party and a year end wrap up party to be held in June.

Home and School Meetings:

We have had scheduled but if the need arises, we will add more to our scheduled calendar. We have had consistent attendance at the Home and School meetings, from a small, but very dedicated parent body.

Executive Committee Positions:

The majority of positions have been filled and we are currently looking to fill the Co-President's position. It has worked very well over the past few years to have two volunteers for each executive position for a two-year term. This allows for continuity within the executive committee and ultimately a well-run Home and School.

School Development Plan:

VRCS is in Year 2 of the 3 year cycle in the school development plan where we are focusing on a couple of areas we wish to improve upon that include reading comprehension, family literacy and parental engagement.

Additional Funds Disbursements:

As a Home and School committee we annually donate funds to the school in a way that our children will benefit most, either through education or through play. This year's special projects that have been approved are as follows:

Funding for transportation for Special Needs Students - This money will pay for mileage for the Educational Assistants as they take the students on outings.

Food Cupboard - This food is used for students that do not have food with them for snacks or lunches.

Girls Basketball Team - The girls and parents have done a huge amount of fund-raising and have purchased new uniforms for the 15 girls on the team. The request for 1/3 of the cost of the uniforms was approved.

Playground Equipment - A considerable amount of money will be needed to properly outfit the playground with new equipment. It was suggested that this year's Home and School start a "Playground Equipment Fund". The need for a large fund-raiser with student and or community involvement project similar to one that was launched at Glen Stewart School was discussed. More discussion is required for a larger number of the parent body.

Hot Lunch Program:

e currently have a very talented outside provider for our Hot Lunch Program, Dianne Fullerton of Borrowed Cupboard. She has a very health conscious and varied menu. The quality and variety of the menu items speak for themselves. She is now offering fresh muffins each morning for sale as well has developed an advanced menu that includes; chicken wraps, spaghetti and meat sauce, meatballs and rice, fruit, healthy cookies and low fat ice cream. We are very pleased to have Dianne continue her service at the school.

Healthy Eating Alliance:

The monies received from the Health Eating Alliance to supplement our healthy snacks are being well utilized. The Education Assistants are working with a group of special needs students to produce the healthy snacks for the school. This will not only benefit the entire the student body but will also assist the students in acquiring necessary skills.

School Improvements:

proposal has been received to create solid walls for the majority of classrooms. The floor plan was reviewed and is available at the school. The band room will be moved into the school and sound proofed. This work will hopefully occur over the summer school break.

Fund-raising Events:

We will be continuing with our annual fund-raiser that we have planned which is for the spring when we hold a meat draw and sell tickets. This fund-raiser has always been successful in the past for our students, thanks to the support of Steerman's Quality Meats (a family run business of two).

Annual Events:

Each year we undertake several volunteer events that include:

Staff and Teacher Appreciation - We provide each staff member with daily treats, hand written cards and on the final day a catered lunch is provided by parents and students assist in the service.

Volunteer Appreciation Tea - This tea party is held every May and we provide tea and sweets for all of our volunteers. Students, parents and teachers assist with the service and preparation.

End of Year Field Trip/Fun Day - Is organized each year with the assistance of the staff and parents for all students. It is usually held at Lord Selkirk Park with fun events and a BBQ.

Closing Comments:

We have had a great year with much progress on outstanding issues and an excellent working relationship with the staff of our School. Resolution 1/08 PUBLIC SCHOOL-BASED KINDERGARTEN

WHEREAS the effects of the disparity in levels of education upon entering the public school system follows a child through their education; and

WHEREAS in all provinces except PEI, this introduction to the education system takes place through a publicly funded, public school based kindergarten; and

WHEREAS kindergarten in PEI is publicly funded and guided by a provincial curriculum, but is delivered through a community-based system of private and non-profit facilities; and

WHEREAS declining enrolment has created the capacity within the education system to accommodate additional students;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation request the Department of Education to take the necessary steps to develop and implement a publicly funded school-based full-day kindergarten program within PEI's education system by the year 2010.

Resolution 2/08 POLICY FOR EXTENDED INTERRUPTION OF CLASSES DURING
MID-TERM AND FINAL EXAMS DUE TO EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

WHEREAS successful outcomes for Intermediate School (Grade 9) and Senior High School examinations are crucial for subsequent grade courses, entrance to post secondary studies and scholarships; and

WHEREAS extended interruption of a student's preparation for these examinations due to unavoidable circumstances such as storms and power outages can have a negative impact on scholastic outcomes; and

WHEREAS all Island students should be provided a consistent policy for School Boards to respond to such situations;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that PEIHSF recommend to the Department of Education and to the various school boards that current policies be amended or new policies be developed as required to ensure that, if an extended period of school closures occur during Mid-Term and Final Exams timeframes, due to weather, power outages, etc. both at home and in school, that examinations will be rescheduled in a consistent manner to ensure the students can adequately prepare.

POLICY FOR MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR COACH TRAINING AND CERTIFICATION

WHEREAS physical activity is essential to the well-being and healthy development of children and youth; and

WHEREAS sport is a key form of physical activity, and also contributes to the social and personal development of children and youth through development of values and ethical standards, interpersonal and leadership skills, lifelong friendships, teamwork skills, self-discipline, and self-esteem and a sense of belonging; and

WHEREAS coaches play a core role in realizing these benefits for children and youth through the way in which they carry out their role; and

WHEREAS negative experiences with coaches may have lasting harmful effects on children's well-being, self-esteem, and participation in sport; and

WHEREAS current policies pertaining to the role of volunteers in schools are very broad, placing extensive discretion with the principal regarding screening, roles, activities, and requirements; and

WHEREAS the safe and healthy development of children and youth requires that volunteer coaches be of good character, be familiar with and consistently use positive and supportive coaching techniques and philosophies, and model high standards of ethics, respect, and sportsmanlike behavior;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that minimum standards for coach training and certification be established for all volunteers and teachers coaching sport in the school setting, and that the PEIHSF partner with the PEI Department of Education, School Boards, the PEI School Athletic Association and the Provincial Sport Organizations to develop such standards.

WHEREAS violent incidents and violent intruders in the school environment pose a significant risk to the safety of students; and

WHEREAS emerging best practice to deal with a threat of violence in the school environment consists of lockdown procedures to secure students and staff in the classrooms, rather than school evacuation; and

WHEREAS other jurisdictions have established or are in the process of establishing lockdown policies and procedures; and

WHEREAS in PEI, existing emergency procedures and drills only pertain to evacuation of schools; and

WHEREAS work is currently in progress by police and boards in PEI to develop lockdown procedures and policies; and

WHEREAS such policies and procedures, although necessary for the safety of our children, must be designed and implemented in such a way as to minimize their traumatic effects and to avoid creating a climate of fear among students;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEIHSF seek to participate in the process of developing and implementing such policies to ensure that they safeguard our children as fully as possible while minimizing any negative impacts on their emotional well-being.

WHEREAS enrolment in Island schools is in the midst of a long-term decline, from 24,000 in 2000-01 to 21,000 in the current year, to a projected 17,000 a decade hence; and

WHEREAS declines are taking place unevenly across PEI schools as population shifts from rural to urban areas; and

WHEREAS the Department of Education has tendered a major study on the issue of changing enrollments and how the projected future trends will impact on all Island schools and to develop options that could be implemented to deal with the anticipated future enrollments; and

WHEREAS the second phase of this work is to consist of a series of public consultations to inform the public about the anticipated impacts of changing enrollment, and to gauge public interest and support for the various options contained in the report; and

WHEREAS this process may result in significant changes to the number of schools across PEI and to public investment in education;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Federation supports the development of criteria for system change which place top priority on providing the best possible learning opportunities to our children; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any savings realized as a result of system change be reinvested in education rather than shifted to another area of public expenditure.

Resolution 6/08 RESOURCES TO MEET NEEDS ARISING FROM CHANGE TO AGE OF SCHOOL ENTRY

Submitted by the PEI Home and School Federation Board

WHEREAS the Department of Education has recently announced a decision to change the cut-off date for age of school entry from August 31 to October 31, effective in the 2008-09 school year; and

WHEREAS this measure means that approximately 260 children born in September and October 2002 will now be eligible to attend school in September 2008; and

WHEREAS some of those children will be enrolled by their parents, and will have had only three months of kindergarten preparation or none at all; and

WHEREAS this change will result in an age range of 14 months in next year's Grade One cohort, which will endure throughout their school experience; and

WHEREAS it is probable that a higher than average proportion of these new students will require additional supports and resource given their younger age and lower level of preparation; and

WHEREAS school staffing allocations had already been established before this decision was taken;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Department of Education invest additional bridging resources in teaching, Reading Recovery, and other resources as needed to ensure that the needs of both these additional students and of previously enrolled students are fully met, and that they are as fully prepared as possible for the remainder of their school experience.

MEMORANDUM OF ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE 1. NAME

1. The name of the organization shall be *(e.g Your School Name Home & School Association)*, hereafter to be referred to as "the Association." *[Your school]* Elementary School shall be referred to as "the school."

ARTICLE 2. AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- * To obtain the best for each child in Prince Edward Island.
- * To promote the welfare of all children and youth in this province.
- * To foster cooperation between parents and teachers, so that every Island child may grow to his or her full potential.
- * To give parents an understanding of the school and its administration.
- * To be informed, constructive partners with educators.
- * To promote high standards of well being in each child's life.
- * To promote the care and protection of children and youth.
- * To promote affiliations with any organizations which concern themselves with the care and development of children and youth, in the home, school and community
- * To obtain the best for each child according to his or her physical, mental, social and spiritual needs.
- * To foster high ideals of citizenship and to promote through educational means, international goodwill and peace

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE 1: POLICIES

- 1.1 The policies of the Association shall be educational.
- 1.2 The policies of the Association shall be non-commercial, non-political, and non-sectarian.

ARTICLE 2: BANKING & CHEQUES

- 2.1 The Association shall open a bank account with a registered financial institution selected by the Association Executive.
- 2.2 Cheques of the Association bank account shall be signed by two (2) of the following three (3) people: the President, the Vice-President, and the Treasurer.

ARTICLE 3: MEMBERSHIP & FEES

- 3.1 Active membership shall be open to all parents/guardians of students attending the school.
- 3.2 Active membership shall be open to all teachers and staff working at the school.
- 3.3 Associate membership (non-voting) shall be open to those members of the community who subscribe to the aims and objectives of the Association and who are not eligible for active membership as defined in sections 3.1 and 3.2 above.
- 3.4 Individual membership dues may be charged at the decision of the Association. If dues are charged, the level should be set at a general meeting of the Association.
[Note: Some schools find that by charging dues for members to attend ie. Single \$5.00, Family \$10.00, they have more members out to meetings. This may possibly be due to a feeling of ownership because people have paid for something and therefore want to be a part of it.]
- 3.5 Membership fees in the provincial Federation shall be submitted annually by November 30 of the school year, as per the following formula: \$100.00 for schools having 200 or more students and \$50.00 for schools having fewer than 200 students.

ARTICLE 4: THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- 4.1 The Officers of the Association will be comprised of:
 - President (1 vote in the event of a tie)
 - Vice-President (1 vote)
 - Treasurer (1 vote)
 - Secretary (1 vote)
- 4.2 A majority of the Officers of the Association shall be parent members.
- 4.3 The Officers of the Association shall serve as the Executive Committee of the Association.

ARTICLE 5: FUNCTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee of the Association shall be responsible for:

- 5.1 The management of the Association and its affairs.
- 5.2 The establishment of ad hoc committees as need arises.

- 5.3 In the event of a vacancy occurring on the executive, shall have the power to elect any active member of the Association to fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term of the executive member whose vacancy is being filled.

ARTICLE 6: TERMS OF OFFICE

- 6.1 The term of office for all officers and members of the Executive Committee shall be for one year.
- 6.2 Officers and members of the Executive Committee are eligible for re-election to their position for a second and third successive year but shall not be eligible for re-election to the same position for more than three consecutive years.
- 6.3 The term of office shall be from **October 1 to September 30**.
[Note: *Terms of office should coincide with the fiscal year as set out in section xx below. Some Associations begin their year in September and others begin in late spring.*]
- 6.4 If an executive member is absent for more than two consecutive, scheduled executive meetings without good cause, and without prior notification to the President or secretary, than that office may be considered vacant by a majority vote of the executive.

ARTICLE 7: ELECTION OF EXECUTIVE

- 7.1 The Executive may appoint a Nomination Committee by May 31 of each year.
- 7.2 The Nomination Committee shall consist of the Past President of the Association (chairperson) and two additional members of the Association.
- 7.3 The Nomination Committee shall present its nomination for the various positions to the membership at the Annual General Meeting.
- 7.4 Nominations shall also be called for and may be made from the floor of the Annual General Meeting. If a person is nominated who is not present at the meeting, his or her consent to be nominated shall be presented to the Chairperson of the Nominations Committee.
- 7.4 Election of officers shall be by secret ballot decided by a simple majority (50 % plus 1) of votes cast.

ARTICLE 8: MEETINGS/VOTING

- 8.1 The Annual General Meeting of the Association shall be held in the **first** month of the school academic term.
- 8.2 There shall be a minimum of **three (3)** General Meetings of the membership conducted per year including the Annual General Meeting.
- 8.3 The Executive may call Special General Meetings of the Association at any time.
- 8.4 A quorum of **ten (10)** shall be required at a General Meeting to pass any motions.
[Note: *The number for your quorum will have to be based on average numbers out to your meetings. Ideally, the quorum should be large enough that the members present outnumber the executive.*]

8.5 Decisions shall be based on a simple majority (50 % plus 1) vote of the membership.

ARTICLE 9 DUTIES OF OFFICERS

9.1 The President shall:

1. Chair all meetings of the Association and Executive.
2. Decide on all questions of procedure and order not covered by the Constitution & By-laws.
3. Supervise the general management of the affairs of the Association.
4. Perform duties incidental to the office.
5. Serve as "Ex-Officio" member of all committees except the Nomination Committee.
6. Be the official spokesperson for the Association.

9.2 The Vice-President shall:

1. In the absence of the President, preside as chairperson at all meetings of the Association and Executive.
2. Perform the duties of the President during his/her absence.
3. Be responsible for developing and distributing monthly newsletter.
4. Perform duties assigned by the President or by the Executive.
5. Assume the office of President should the President be unable to complete his or her term of office.

9.3 The Treasurer shall:

1. Receive and hold all monies of the Association.
2. Keep an accurate record of all receipts and disbursements.
3. Pay out such monies as voted upon in the budget at the Annual General Meeting.
4. Have the books of account balanced as of September 30th of each year.
5. Prepare statements of disbursements for the Executive Committee.
6. Prepare for approval at the Annual General Meeting a complete statement of receipts and disbursements during the fiscal year of the Association.
7. Prepare with the assistance of the Executive Committee a budget to be approved at the Annual General Meeting.
8. Arrange for the financial records to be audited by a person agreed upon by the Executive.

9.4 The Secretary shall:

1. Keep a written record of the proceedings and attendance at all meetings of the Association and process said records for distribution or presentation.
2. Perform duties assigned by the President or by the Executive.

ARTICLE 10 FINANCES

10.1 The fiscal year of the Association shall be October 1 to September 30.

10.2 Funds over and above the Association expenses shall go toward carrying out the aims and objectives of the Association.

10.3 The Executive shall have the power to expend the funds of the Association in accordance with the objectives of the Association and the agreement (i.e. proposed budget, and motions recorded in minutes) of the general membership.

10.4 The Treasurer and one of the other two signing officers shall sign all cheques.

- 10.5 The Executive shall have the authority to approve up to \$500.00 per item on a non-recurring basis for requests that occur outside of the approved budget and throughout the fiscal year.

[Note: Some schools find it difficult to try and organize a general meeting should funds be required quickly. If the above item is passed in your By-laws then it allows the Executive to deal with these emergency non-planned requests. i.e. shortage of money for a bus trip.]

- 10.6 Receipts must be provided for all expenses incurred.
- 10.7 The Treasurer shall arrange to have the financial records audited annually. A formal auditor is not necessary but someone who the Executive Committee agrees upon.

ARTICLE 11 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

- 11.1 The business to be transacted at the Annual General Meeting shall be the consideration of committee reports, the election of officers, budget, appointment of auditors and other such business that may arise.
- 11.2 At least six (6) weeks notice shall be given in writing to members of all Annual General Meetings, such notice to state the subjects to be considered including the registration fee if any.
- 11.3 All members of the Association are entitled to attend the Annual General Meeting and to speak to any motion or address the chair, present or second motions and vote.

ARTICLE 12 PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

- 12.1 Roberts Rules of Order shall govern all points respecting the holding and conduct of meetings of the Association not covered otherwise in these By-laws.

ARTICLE 13 AMENDING THE MEMORANDUM OF ASSOCIATION & BY-LAWS

- 13.1 The Memorandum of Association and By-laws may be amended at an Annual General Meeting or Special Meeting of the Association, provided that due notice of the proposed amendment has been circulated to members at least six (6) weeks prior to the meeting.

ARTICLE 14 PEIHSF or PROVINCIAL MEETINGS

- 14.1 As a member of the Prince Edward Island Home and School Federation, the Association is eligible to send five voting delegates to two provincial meetings, Semi-Annual and Annual. Associations may pay registration and travel expenses for these delegates.

ARTICLE 15 DISSOLUTION

- 15.1 If this Association desires to disband, it shall notify the Prince Edward Island Home and School Federation by letter, addressed to the President, giving reasons, at least sixty days before taking further action.
- 15.2 Upon disbanding, the books of the Association shall become the property of the Prince Edward Island Home and School Federation.

15.3 Any funds held by the Association at the time of disbanding will be given to the Association's school or to another charity as determined by the Association's membership.
