



BUSINESS PROCEDURE FOR ANNUAL MEETING

- The Annual General Meeting is conducted in accordance with our **Constitution and By- Laws**. In the case of any procedural dispute, reference shall be made to Parliamentary Procedures which is based on **Robert's "Rules of Order"**.
- Each Local Association may have **five voting delegates**, all **members** may attend
- Each voting delegate shall have one vote provided their Association Membership Fees have been paid to PEIHSF by the Annual Meeting date. Each member of the Federation's Executive and Board of Directors shall also be entitled to one vote.
- 4. Voting shall be by ballot or show of hands. All questions shall be decided by a majority of those voting, except those which require two-thirds (2/3) majority; the President having a deciding vote in case of a tie.
- A delegate speaking from the floor shall address the Chair and wait to be recognized. When a sound system is being used, delegates should proceed to a microphone, then wait until the Chair indicates it is their turn to speak.
- A delegate may not speak for more than two minutes on any question under discussion, not more than once on the same question unless requested or permitted by the Chair to clarify a point. However, the mover of a motion or resolution shall have the privilege of speaking first to begin discussion and speaking last to close debate on the question.

MEETING TIPS

- Plan to enjoy the meetings. As a representative of your Association, it is your responsibility to help make it a success.
- 2. This is YOUR Annual Meeting YOU transact the business of the Federation and set the policy to be followed in the coming year for the PEIHSF.
- 3. **Be courteous** to speakers by listening attentively. Avoid private conversations and remain seated when others are speaking.
- Speaking from the floor a member wishing to speak from the floor shall address the Chair, give their name in full and the name of the Association represented.
- Do find time to exchange ideas and information. Be friendly, mix with delegates from other parts of the province. Don't wait for them to speak first. They may also be a bit shy and a first-time delegate to an Annual Meeting.
- 6. **Say "hello" to your Board of Directors** They are elected to represent you between Annual Meetings by the Local Association members and they would like to meet you personally
- 7. **Do take notes** in order that you may report back to your Association, the actions taken, business transacted, ideas and inspirations gained **Share information with your members** knowledge, hand-outs and other material acquired during the Annual Meeting

PEI Home and School Federation President's Report: Peter Rukavina 2015 Annual General Meeting

The theme of this year's Annual General Meeting, "From Ideas to Action," is itself a call to action for home and schools, an encouragement to shift the conversation from "why don't **they**" to "why don't **we**".

Perhaps at no time in recent history has public education been more discussed in the public sphere than over the last year: in the media, in the coffee shops, around the home and school table and in the Legislative Assembly.

Home and school, because we count as our members those who know children first as *individuals*, has a unique perspective in these discussions: while others must concentrate on trends and data and populations and multi-million-dollar budgets, every home and school conversation starts from the perspective of those with a connection to *individual* students: my child, my student

Being rooted in the individual student, yet being an organization thousands-strong, means local home and schools individually, and gathered together under the federation banner, are well-positioned to have substantial influence in shaping public education in the province. To do this effectively means realizing our full potential as active participants in the education system, working closely with our partners while at the same time remaining focused on the "total well-being of children and the highest standards of education for each child."

As I began my two-year term as PEI Home and School Federation President after our 2014. Annual General Meeting, I set out five general policy priorities for our board:

- 1. Reinforcing, through the Home & School family, that **teachers**, **staff and administrators** are all members in Home & School. We need to spread the word about this at all levels, and to encourage local associations to encourage engagement by teachers, staff and administrators in all aspects of their activities. We are not (only) an organization of parents, we are a group that fosters cooperation amongst all partners in the education system.
- Working to increase engagement at the intermediate school level. We know that this is where parental engagement starts to fall off, and we need to present new ways for parents to engage at this level, to nurture our local associations at this level.
- 3 Fostering cooperation between home & schools within the families of schools. The PAGE group from Summerside (Parkside, Athena, Greenfield & Elm Street) cooperated on the Sticks and Stones project which hosted leaders in the community and school board in a discussion of child wellness and safety in the schools, home and community, and the five downtown elementary schools in Charlottetown organized a family recreation day.
- 4. **Working on communication at all levels**. So many of the challenges in education in the last two years come down to miscommunication, or poor communication. We need to work with our partners to model what good communication is, and to present concrete models "here's an example of a well-designed, clear school newsletter" that can be used as starting points

5 Channelling energy around local issues into the policy development process. When local issues arise – Reading Recovery, kindergarten class sizes, dogs in the classroom, school overcrowding – our most useful response provincially is to work with our local members to turn the energy around these issues into resolutions

These five priorities have guided my work as President, and our actions as a provincial board.

The heart of our activities as a provincial board continues to rest in our subcommittees, which are chaired by members of the board but include in their membership a wide variety of parents, guardians, teachers, administrators and staff helping to contribute to the discussion

As such, these committees – Assessment and Evaluation, Staffing Allocation Model, Technology, School Trustees, Communication Between Home and School, Healthy Living / Wellness, Finance, Staffing/HR, Parent Engagement, and School Calendar are not only an effective way for the PEIHSF to focus our efforts, but also a vehicle to broaden participation to a larger group.

If an overarching theme has emerged in our home and school discussions this year it has been a realization that everything in education is interconnected:

If my child goes to school without eating breakfast, and spends the morning collaborating with your child on a group project, then their lack of breakfast is as much a challenge for you to address as it is for me

If we want to ensure that our teachers receive the training they need to engage our students, they need professional development opportunities throughout the school year. But those opportunities mean less time in school for our students, which results in fewer hours in the classroom, and stress for families trying to find childcare.

Every issue in education emerges as a complex jigsaw puzzle of competing priorities and resources, and the only way to navigate this complexity, and to ensure the most effective education for all students, is constant communication and collaboration among all of the partners in public education, home and school primary among them

From Ideas to Action: Ready to Help Organize Where Desired

At our Annual General Meeting, and in the weeks and months to come, I challenge each of you to look at every issue in public education that arises as an opportunity for action:

Is the issue of broad enough importance that it could become the basis for a provincial resolution at our next Annual Meeting?

Could your home and school apply for a parent leadership grant to help address the issue?

Would your school administrator be willing to discuss the issue at your next home and school meeting?

Could your local home and school collaborate with other schools in your family of schools on a project to address the issue?

Could you, as an individual, take action?

This approach is deep within the DNA of our Federation: at our first Annual General Meeting, held on July 10, 1953, my predecessor, Mrs J Gordon MacDonald, in her first annual report, stated:

Our Provincial Federation stands ready to help organize where desired and it brings us in touch with what is happening educationally in other parts of Canada, where they have many problems similar to our own. Those outside influences tend to dissipate the insularity which is part of our Island heritage, a heritage which in other respects claims many intrinsic charms. This fast changing world of ours today calls for changed educational conditions and we dare not lag behind.¹

It is in this grand tradition that we gather here today, and so I conclude with a thanks to those parents, teachers, administrators and staff that laid the path we follow

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by President Pam Montgomery at 8:45 p.m.

Marion Murphy acted as Parliamentarian. Ellen Campbell acted as Recording Secretary. There were 105 voting delegates in attendance. Of the 54 member schools of the Federation, 40 schools were represented.

Marion Murphy led the Home and School Prayer and Creed.

President Pam Montgomery introduced the head table and members of the PEIHSF executive in attendance.

1. Approval of Agenda

2. Approval of Minutes of 2013 Annual General Meeting

3. President's Report

Pam Montgomery referenced her President's Report, included in the Book of Reports on p. 9-11, and provided a brief summary of the past year's highlights.

4. Financial Report

Treasurer Shelley Muzika presented a report on the financial position of the PEIHSF, referencing the financial information starting on page 21 of the book of reports

- Higher grant revenue in 2013 due to funding received from the Telus project;

WHEREAS parents/guardians are not adequately informed by the English Language School Board of the potential legal and monetary implications of signing said form, and

WHEREAS the reading skills of 30% of PEI adults are so limited that they can't deal with most printed material. An additional 35% of PEI adults need printed materials written in plain language*, and

WHEREAS among the adults that do not have difficulty reading, few can decipher legal jargon;

E-CIGARETTES

WHEREAS the percentage of young smokers trying tobacco products increases as age and grade increases with 15.5% of youth in grades 6–9 have tried a tobacco product and 40% of youth in grades 10–12 have tried a tobacco product, and

WHEREAS new tobacco products including electronic cigarettes continue to be introduced to the marketplace that attract new users such as children and youth, and

WHEREAS Health Canada and the World Health Organization do not recommend the purchase or use of electronic cigarettes because of the potential health risks and the lack of testing for safety, quality and efficacy, and

WHEREAS scientific evidence to support the use of e-cigarettes to quit smoking is still inconclusive, and

WHEREAS there are concerns that the use of electronic cigarettes provides a negative example, similar to conventional cigarette smoking and that modeling tobacco free lifestyles is important in building healthy habits especially in children and youth;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the P E I Home and School Federation requests the English Language School Board to adopt and communicate the former Eastern School Board Policy ADC-R: Tobacco Product Usage Ban which prohibits products that 'reasonably resemble tobacco or tobacco products' including e-cigarettes, chewing tobacco and snuff; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the P.E.I. Home and School Federation requests the Minister of Health and Wellness to broaden the definition of 'tobacco-related product' in the Tobacco Sales and Access Act to include e-cigarettes, chewing tobacco, snuff and any other products containing or reasonably resembling tobacco or tobacco products.



WHEREAS the Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) quantifies trends and measures educational outcomes in three key areas (reading, mathematics and science), assessing the extent to which youth at age 15 have acquired the essential knowledge and skills for full participation in modern society; and

in a global economy, educational success is not measured against provincial or national standards, but against the top performing educational systems in the world; and

WHEREAS PISA scores for PEI students decreased significantly from 2003 to 2012 – in 2012 PEI students were unique in Canada in scoring below the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) average (and the lowest in Canada) in all three domains - science, reading and math; and

WHEREAS the recent PISA report confirms that PEI was the only province in Canada to score below the OECD average in all three domains: reading, mathematics and science, and

WHEREAS the 2012 PISA results show the average math score for PEI students was 39 points, or a full year of schooling, below Canadian average and 11 points below the next Canadian province; and

WHEREAS 25% of PEI students scored below level 2 in math, the OECD benchmark level, meaning they do not have the baseline mathematical proficiency required to participate fully in society; and





NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2014

(UNAUDITED)

1. MISSION

PEI Home and School Federation Inc is a not-for-profit organization incorporated under the laws of the province of Prince Edward Island. The Federations principal activities include the promotion of the total well-being of children and the highest standards of education for each child in the province. The Federation works in partnership with other organizations who foster this ideal. The Federation encourages and whenever possible assists in the development of policies related particularly to quality education for each child and generally to the total well-being of children in Prince Edward Island.

2 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

a) Revenue recognition

(i) Grants and members dues

Grants and members dues are recognized proportionately over the fiscal year to which they relate Revenues received in advance of the fiscal year to which they relate are recorded as deferred revenue

(ii) Investment income

Investment income comprises interest from term deposits. Revenue is recognized on an accrual basis.

b) Donated services

The work of the Federation is dependent on the voluntary service of many individuals. Since these services are not normally purchased by the Federation and because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, donated services are not recognized in the financial statements

c) Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the current period. Actual results may differ from the estimates, the impact of which would be recorded in future periods

3. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Federation is exposed to various risks through financial instruments, such as cash, investments, accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

Credit risk

Cash and investments: Credit risk associated with cash and Canadian fixed income investments is minimized by ensuring that these assets are invested in guaranteed investment certificates

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Federation will not be able to meet a demand for cash or fund its obligations as they come due

The Federation meets its liquidity requirements by anticipating investing and financing activities and holding assets that can readily converted into cash

Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices Market risk is comprised of currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk

Interest rate risk

The Federations cash includes amounts on deposit with financial institutions that earn interest at market rates

Changes in risk

There have been no significant changes in the Federations risk exposures from the previous year

4. DEFERRED REVENUE

Deferred revenue represents grants received in the current and prior fiscal years for expenditures that will be incurred in future fiscal years, and are related to the Parental Involvement and Telus projects
The Statement of Operations grant revenue has been increased or reduced accordingly.

Thus far this is a subcommittee of 1 (me). I have had many conversations about assessment and evaluation issues with many different people over the past 7 months, since agreeing to head up this committee. Although I've been feeling somewhat guilty about not gathering a group together to form the subcommittee, I have come to the conclusion that I've done what feels like necessary ground work, or the start-up work required to head up a subcommittee. I wanted to understand first from the people working in education at various levels, what is happening around assessment and evaluation, what all the tests mean, how they are used etc. It's my intention to continue with this work into next year, and to more formally get a working group together to meet and discuss issues surrounding assessment and evaluation.

- Activities related to this subcommittee:

- At the end of November 2014, Queen Charlotte Intermediate invited Tammy Hubley-Little to come to the school and speak about the Progress Monitoring and Reporting Queen Charlotte is one of the schools piloting the new system this year. Allie Keedwell (president of Queen Charlotte Home and School) arranged to invite other Colonel Gray Family schools to the meeting and the invitation was circulated via e-mail to the presidents of the Home and School groups for each of the schools. There was a good turn out from Queen Charlotte parents, but not from other schools, unfortunately. Perhaps in the future, this is something I can work on to communicate cross-school events. This was an excellent presentation and discussion and I would highly recommend that other schools piloting this new system consider planning a similar evening
- Oct. 27th I attended a workshop sponsored by the Council of Ministers of Education Canada (CMEC) on large-scale data analysis using PISA as a data set. This was very interesting to learn more about the test itself and how the data gets processed and analyzed. I also met some of the people working in this area, both here on PEI (Elizabeth Costa) and from other parts of the region
- At both the semi-annual PEIHSF meeting in October and the brainstorming session in January at Spring Park, excellent discussions on issues of assessment and evaluation were had. Notes from both meetings were captured and are available on the PEIHSF website. As I continue with this subcommittee, I'll refer back to what was highlighted from these discussions
- I would like to create and circulate, via local home and school groups, a short questionnaire to gather feedback on what issues are of importance to parents in the area of assessment and evaluation.

The Communication Committee has been exploring the issue of parent engagement and the "falling off" affect that so often occurs as students move into intermediate and senior high.

As a valuable means of gathering information on this issue, a series of roundtable discussions on communication were held during the semi-annual meeting in October 2014. Those in attendance provided great insight regarding what communication tools work and where there is room for improvement

Overwhelmingly, parents were clear in their continued support and encouragement of clear and timely communication between home and school. Email, Parent/Teacher Conferences and websites were identified as useful tools. However, parents expressed increased frustrations with the number of teacher blogs and homework sites that they and their children must consult on a regular basis. Feedback suggested that parents would much prefer a more streamlined approach to communication — a one-stop approach — that would allow them easier access to and navigation of important and relevant student data, marks, homework, attendance and subject notes and instructions

Parents continue to suggest that the StudentsAchieve System, when used by teachers in a timely and relevant way, is an effective strategy to engage in their student's education. Further, parents asked why teachers use so many other communication tools when SAS is already available to them.

Committee initiative:

• The Communication Committee submitted a resolution to the Resolution Committee for consideration. See below for further details.

Committee recommendation:

• That the DEECD provide parents with a progress report on the recommendations set out in their 2009 SAS parent/teacher survey.

Clear and effective communication is vital for student success. Parent engagement also plays an important role in this process. The Communication Committee will continue to explore communication strategies and tools to further improve student achievement.

PEI HOME AND SCHOOL FEDERATION Technology in Education Sub Committee Report Ricardo Angel, Chair

Great progress in several fronts was made this year, from great utilization and uptake of the PEI Home and School Federation's Robotics and Computing Program, to important commitments from the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development to improve educational technology in PEI schools

More than 15 schools borrowed the Robotics and Computing Kit last year to introduce more than 500 elementary students to practical engineering and programming concepts while building and controlling Lego robots following a collaborative project-based approach.

Given the students' engagement and interest, two schools purchased their own Raspberry Pi micro-computers and Lego WeDo robotics kits to be able to offer this STEM Program to all students in each grade, from grades 1 to 6

Through the support of their local Home and School associations, several other schools purchased tablets and are integrating their use to enhance the learning experience of all types of learners

This subcommittee had the opportunity to provide feedback on the IBM report and recommendations to improve the use of educational technology in PEI schools.

Based on lessons learned and successful implementations in other jurisdictions across Canada, we supported the recommended program-led embedding of technology in the teaching and learning process, the necessary training for teachers, and the expansion of the role of the teacher-librarian and of school libraries to become hubs on the use of educational technology and if possible Maker Spaces.

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development made important commitments and has started making several improvements to the infrastructure required to provide better access to tools and resources teachers and students need, from faster connectivity at every school in PEI, to newer tools to share information and collaborate

These and other exciting initiatives underway demonstrate the great progress made towards the goal of better preparing our children for their future

Tobacco Control highlights include efforts by the Council For a Smoke-Free PEI and PEI Tobacco Reduction Alliance: Aimed at Youth(PETRA).

#1 Electronic Smoking Devices (ESDs)

PEI's Department of Health and Wellness is concerned with a growing popularity of e-cigarettes or electronic smoking devices (ESDs).

- ESDs content is unknown and unregulated.
- ESDs may contain nicotine, herbs, flavourings, chemicals and toxins
- Amendments to the PEI Tobacco Sales and Access Act and Smoke-Free Places Act were drafted by the Department of Health and Wellness in 2014 and included proposed legislation on ESDs the eddid not make it to legislation

#2 Flavoured Tobacco

Flavoured tobacco use is high among Canadian youth. PEI's Chief Public Health Officer and Department of Health and Wellness is concerned about the use of flavoured tobacco. Although overall tobacco use among Canadian youth is declining, flavoured tobacco use remains high; in part, increasing rates of use of alternate tobacco forms, such as water-pipes (hookah) or smokeless tobacco, might help to explain the high prevalence of flavoured tobacco use.

#3 Revealing the Truth: High School Curriculum Guide


The PEI Reduction Alliance (PETRA)'s strategic plan focus on susceptible youth under 20, resulted in the development of a curriculum resource "Revealing the Truth – A Tobacco Media Awareness Resource for Teachers" which was launched in Island high schools Fall 2014-2015 school year. This resource aims to educate high school students about the harmful effects of tobacco products, the marketing tactics used by the tobacco industry, and education campaigns organized by public health organizations.

- The resource was adapted from similar resources found in other provinces and will be a supporting document to the Grade 10 Language Arts and Physical Education curriculum of the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development English programs
- The resource activities encourage students to review both tobacco and health promotion advertisements. During class sessions, students will rate how effective the advertisements are to most likely influence them to not take up smoking and/or to want to quit. These advertisements will also be used for discussion on tobacco use from a youth perspective. Another lesson plan will encourage students to create their own videos/posters/PSAs, etc. using the advertising techniques discussed in the resource and possibly presented to other students.

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development was a partner providing input and feedback to maximize the resource for Island students while members of UPEI's Comprehensive School

- #5 Broaden the Reach of the Ottawa Model for Smoking Cessation
- #6 Promote and support multiple points of access to smoking cessation
- #7 Improve access to cessation medications and nicotine replacement therapies (NRT)

The Issue

Tobacco use in Prince Edward Island remains the leading cause of preventable disease and death; linked to thousands of avoidable, premature deaths. Of the 1,268 deaths on PEI in 2009, approximately 210 were attributable to smoking.

Economic Considerations

Smoking already costs Islanders over \$70 million in productivity losses due to the premature deaths of smokers, and millions more in direct costs to Island employers.

Smoking reportedly costs \$10 million in direct costs and \$43 million in lost productivity, and second-hand smoke costs another \$47 million

What will have an Impact?

The Council for a Smoke-Free PEI believes that there is a need for further support of comprehensive smoking cessation (for youth/adults). We believe that improved access to cessation programs and appropriate medications and nicotine replacement therapies will make a difference.

We can make a real difference in further reducing smoking rates in Prince Edward Island (ending the current stagnation in the rate), significantly lessening the burden that smoking-related illness places on our healthcare system, and, most importantly, improving the lives of the many Islanders still affected by smoking and second-hand smoke.

Home and School volunteers are the heartbeat of school communities! Parents, guardians and educators give generously of their time to make a happy and productive school community. Working together to advocate for the best learning experience for children and youth helps to create a positive, welcoming school community. Comments and questions about how to work together are received in the Federation office throughout the school year. I find myself in a privileged place, at the other end of the phone or e-mail message, where a conversation reveals things that are working well and not so well. We learn from both! A few of these follow

Welcoming Pre-School Families

Question: Can we invite pre-school parents to a Home and School meeting?

Answer: This is a smart decision. Invite parents who will have children entering your school in the Fall. These families will experience an early welcome to the school and may consider joining the executive or a committee. Families transitioning into intermediate and high schools may also appreciate invitations to attend meetings.

Incorporation and Charitable Status

Q. Can a Home and School become incorporated or apply for charitable status?

A: Both have advantages for volunteer groups. Incorporation status is a provincial jurisdiction while Canada Revenue Agency issues charitable status. You will need someone having legal skills. Seek out someone in your school family who has these skills and ask them to consider volunteering their time to assist with this process.

Getting Organized and Succession

Q. We have a brand new executive. No one is stepping forward for the position of president. Does the Federation have tips on finding new volunteers? Is training available? A. Individual and/or group training to help Home and Schools executives is available. A personal "ask" is more time consuming but seems to be more effective. Draft executive role descriptions based on what happens in your Home and School. Use the Federation's handbook as a guide.

Please contact the provincial office when questions arise about how Home and School and we work effectively with our partners in the education system. If we don't have an immediate answer, we will find someone who can help you.

The day-to-day communication activities in the Federation office include:

Paper Notifications: Local presidents receive print mailings 2-3 times during the school year: September school start up, October Semi-Annual registration package and February Annual Meeting & Conference registration package.

E-News: Home and School news is circulated the first of the month, electronically, to presidents, members and school principals. It includes upcoming events and Peter's Guardian column. We ask you to post this information on your Home and School's social media sites and add appropriate discussion

points to your monthly / bi-monthly Home and School meeting's agenda.

Social Media and Website: The Federation's website is updated on a regular basis as well as our Facebook page and Twitter. If you haven't done so, set up social media sites for your local Home and School. Ask another Home and School member at the AGM how they use social media to announce school events, meetings, current education news, school delays/closures and more.

Speakers and Project Ideas: Speakers are available for regular meetings on a variety of topics from - "How do I get organized as a new president", to "Who do I contact at the Department or Board level concerning curriculum, progress monitoring, bus safety, etc." Projects are listed on the website and Jean would be happy to discuss the more successful Projects. Any one of these can be duplicated.

Appreciation: Recognition awards are presented throughout the school year. Establish a Recognition Committee having 2-3 people who will oversee these deadlines. The last one for this school year is the School Bus Driver award deadline is in May.



Parent Leadership Grants

This year the date of the first round was changed from end of December to the end of October to allow associations to have projects earlier in the school year. To this end, there were 8 projects with the total amount awarded ~\$4400.00 Topics included: Helping children cope with anxiety, Young Authors Night, Creating Connections, Family Games Night, Science Exploration Night, Health Fair and Parents and Students Graduation Guide and Food for Thought Nutritional videos.

The date of the second round was changed from the end of February to the end of January. Fourteen applications were received with the total awarded \$8500 and included schools from primary to senior high. Proposals included, but were not limited to math, art, mental health, cyber-safety, food and nutrition and multicultural projects. The 2013-2014 projects involved more than 2000 parents, students, school staff and community partners in roles of organizers, planners, leaders, attendees and participants.

Home and School Banners

Several banners were purchased to lend to local associations for events in their schools. These will be located with regional directors in Summerside and Montague and in the federation office in Charlottetown. If the banners prove to be popular, the committee may consider making a proposal to purchase others.

Home and School Brochures

The Home and School brochures designed for parents of students in grades K to 6 have been freshened up and have been included in Welcome to Kindergarten kits which will be given to all children entering kindergarten in September 2015 and their families. All local associations interested in receiving copies of the brochure should contact the federation office. The brochures designed for parents of older students will be available in the near future.

Minister of Education's motion to the Legislature

The minister of education has submitted a motion of parent engagement to government ahead of the fall session of the Legislature. It mentions the PEI Home and School Federation as being supporters of parent engagement. We were asked to prepare some Home and School initiatives to which he could speak. Eight "success stories" of parent engagement were prepared. Unfortunately, with the early closure of the Legislature, the motion on parent engagement did not get debated, but it will stay on the order paper for the spring session. The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development sent out a press release to communicate the upcoming Parent Leadership grants and the January deadline. 

This Year's Focus:



Staff Appreciation Week:



Out of this meeting, our Home and School developed two motions for the provincial Home and School to consider.

Highlights from the past year:

• The school getting a PEI 2014 grant for a wonderful mural for the library by artist, Warren Reeson, depicting the history of the school.

- The kindergarten students are taking part in a hands-on project on growing and eating healthy food, called "Start with a Seedling," and they are all paired with "Garden Buddies" from the community
- The school won a grant from Multizone, the "Play Exchange Active at School Challenge," and this will fund outdoor play equipment for classrooms and healthy snacks for homerooms.

And at this time, the entire school community is excited to hear the final results of an ArtsSmarts project funded by a grant from Culture PEI. The project has seen the whole school take part in creating a Prince Street School song with songwriter, Liam Corcoran, producer, David Rashed, and instructors from the Holland College School of Performing Arts

During Teacher/Staff Appreciation Week, our Home and School facilitates notes and messages of appreciation from students to teachers and staff, provides snacks for teachers and staff each day, provides a lunch one day, and covers teachers' playground duty one day during the week

Our major fundraiser each year is a community celebration called "Spring Fling," with low-cost snacks, games, and activities for children of all ages. It is very well-attended by students, families, and community members, with parents, teachers, and staff putting in a lot of hard work and effort to make the event a success. Last year's Spring Fling took place on June 6, 2014.

This past fall as a replacement for Movie Nights we have held in the past, our Home and School put on a low-cost Family Fun Night with board games, crafts, dance, science learning games, karaoke, snacks, and more fun for the whole family. This was a huge success for building community in our school! We will definitely want to do this again.

The Prince Street Home and School increasingly finds that we are a needed connection not only between home and school but also between neighbourhood and school. The Family Fun Night connected us with a neighbourhood spirit-building project for the community "North of Euston." The Home and School has also been asked to connect with our neighbours on questions about appropriate development near the school and traffic management. We want to be active to make the school neighbourhood safe and healthy for all.

The volunteer efforts at Prince Street School continue to be phenomenal. Teachers and staff, parents, and neighbours make our breakfast program and much more a success. The school has a wonderful neighbour in Trinity Clifton United Church, whose members help ensure bellies are full and holiday stockings are full and who annually treat the whole school to an old-fashioned turkey dinner before the holidays in December

- the many issues around phone use in school (cyber bullying, criminal activity, etc.)



Spring Park Elementary, a dual-stream school encompassing grades K-6, has approximately 529 students with a significant international population (reaching 100 students in the fall of 2014-1/5 of the total school population) The school continues to grow and in September, enrolment far surpassed the intended capacity (the school opened in March 2013 and was built for a student capacity of 465). The Home and School Association spent much of the year working with the school administration and the Eastern Language School Board to address issues of over population.

While the school has been fortunate in being able to access additional teaching resources and ensuring good class sizes, spaces not intended as classrooms including project based learning rooms have been turned into classroom space. In addition, music and gym classes have seen significant impacts and additional lockers were required to accommodate students.

Through ongoing conversations with the school and the board, it is anticipated that a solution to population concerns and impacts on students and teachers will be found and implemented in advance of the 2015-2016 school year.


Home and School assisted with the school's annual Spooktacular event in October hosting the bake sale Help from parent volunteers to bake and to work at the sale was fantastic.

In December, Home and School organized the annual Christmas Shoppe—a chance for students to shop for Christmas gifts for loved ones. Teacher appreciation:



Robotics




External Funding Sources:

Other Activities


- Our association supported Staff Appreciation Week; various treats for all Westwood staff were brought in by Westwood parents

RESOLUTION 1-2015 STUDENT CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS Submitted by Three Oaks Senior High Parent Council

WHEREAS	it is important for schools to offer character education programs that promote social
	tolerance, provide empathy training and leadership development that increases personal
	power and self esteem, and

- WHEREAS these social skills are important in the ethical development of students and are critical in the development of caring citizens, translating into positive student behaviour in school, home and community, and
- WHEREAS several schools across the province have already recognized the need and benefit of such activities and have undertaken the development and run student workshops at the senior high level such as: Climate Days, Breaking Down the Walls, Challenge Day, and
- WHEREAS the goal of the Character Development Program is to empower the students to carry the themes of the program back to their school and community population, and
- WHEREAS one of the goals of public education on PEI as stated in the "Education Handbook for School Administrators" is to enable students to develop a respect for community values, a sense of personal values and a responsibility for one's actions, and
- WHEREAS one of the guiding principles of the PEI Home and School Federation is to foster high ideals of citizenship;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation requests the English Language School Board and Minister of Education and Early Childhood Development implement age-appropriate character development programs that promote social tolerance, provide empathy training and leadership development, in all schools, primary to 12 grade levels, as part of the School Effectiveness Plan.

BACKGROUND:

Three Oaks Climate Days

Philosophy: Student leaders in any given school building come in many forms and from many social groups. It is virtually impossible to put 800 students through a workshop on empathy training and many do not have the maturity or mindset needed for this to be successful. However, it was determined if the leaders and sub-leaders of the various social groups in the school could be trained, then there would be the possibility of a positive "trickle down" effect to the students who follow them. In this way, we would have a better chance of affecting more students, and this is exactly what happened! All Climate Days, with the exception of Climate Night 2014, were co-facilitated by Nicole Haire and Peter Bolo. Positive student leaders were "planted" in discussion groups to model appropriate participation and keep the discussions flowing.

Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs states that the following "building blocks" must be in place in order for a person to achieve self-actualization:

- Basic Needs (food, clothing, shelter, etc)
- Safety (physical, emotional and psychological)
- Belonging
- Self-Esteem (authentic success due to their own efforts)

Climate Days addresses Safety and Belonging. The time spent establishing and maintaining high expectations for a positive school climate allows students the opportunity to come to school each day and focus more fully on the school work at hand

History:

- The Climate Days workshop was developed by Nicole Haire, in consultation with Leadership teacher Peter Bolo, in the spring of 2011 58 students and 12 teachers participated in the first Climate Day workshop which took place off campus-in "neutral territory"-at the Loyalist Inn
- In the fall of 2011, Phil Boyte was contracted to facilitate his "Breaking Down the Walls" workshop with 300 students over three days. This workshop has a similar philosophy to Climate Days and was held at the school
- In 2012, the Climate Crew was formed by students concerned about fostering and maintaining positive school climate as well as an additional 300 students participated over three days in TOSH Climate Days held at the school
- In the spring of 2013, 100 students participated in a TOSH Climate Days workshop
- In the spring of 2014, 85 students participated after school hours in a 6 hour climate workshop termed "Climate Night".
- In the fall of 2014, 100 students participated in a Climate Day workshop at the school

Summary: The positive "ripple effects" of this workshop have been noticeable and profound. Most of the results come from observation of student behaviour; feedback from students, staff and parents about the positive "feel" of our school; participant surveys; and anecdotal sharing from individuals who say that participating in Climate Days had a significant, positive effect on their lives. Invariably, participants say that it changes how they see others and how they respond to people and situations for the better. Our school has become a gentler, kinder place as a result and bystanders have become more likely to stand up and speak for what is right.

RESOLUTION 2-2015 STORM CLOSURES Submitted by West Kent Home and School Association

WHEREAS the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development and English Language School Board are striving to improve student achievement using multiple initiatives following disappointing PISA and PCAP assessment scores for Prince Edward Island students (which demonstrated that our students scored below the Canadian average in math, reading and science testing;), and

WHEREAS according to Stats Can Publication 81-604-X Table D 1 1, PEI students average 25 8 hours less instructional time than the Canadian average each year, and

WHEREAS PEI students lose significant classroom time due to storm closures, and in the 2013-2014 school year this amounted to an estimated loss of between 5-10% of instructional time, and

WHEREAS cumulative lost classroom time due to storm closures may be a significant contributor to poor academic performance by Island students, and

WHEREAS neither the ELSB nor the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development publish the number of school storm closures on an annual basis, making it difficult to quantify the potential impact on student performance without readily available data, and

WHEREAS some storm closures have been based on predicted vs. actual weather events and prove to be unnecessary, and

WHEREAS some parents are frustrated with the number of school storm closures after a winter storm that seem to be due to a lack of coordinated and/or expeditious snow removal, and

WHEREAS there is no published policy outlining the process by which a decision is made to cancel school;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation (PEIHSF) requests the English Language School Board (ELSB) to form a committee consisting of board and department staff, home and school representatives and transportation experts to review current practices, develop and publish a Storm Closures Policy, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the PEIHSF requests the ELSB to ensure those responsible for storm closure decisions have adequate resources and training to make informed decisions, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the PEIHSF requests the ELSB to publish the number of school days lost to storm closure for each family of schools in the ELSB's Annual Report.

English Language School Board Department of Transportation

BACKGROUND:

ENGLISH LANGUAGE SCHOOL BOARD PROCEDURE:

The English Language School Board collects information from a variety of sources when determining if classes should be cancelled due to weather/road conditions on a daily basis. A team of approximately four staff are involved in the process. The group examines a variety of weather forecasts for the day, reviews road report information from across the province obtained from the Department of Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal, and road condition information obtained from board transportation personnel. The information is compiled between 4:30 AM and 6:00 AM and a decision is usually made prior to 6:30 AM on whether to proceed with the day, initiate a one hour delay, initiate an hour delay with a further announcement, or to close for the day. Family of school closures or delays may be initiated if conditions differ from across the province

RESOLUTION 3-2015 SAFE STUDENT TRANSPORTATION WITH RELATED COMMUNICATION STRATEGIES

WHEREAS	students, parents and guardians need a guarantee of safe and timely transportation to the school as many families are in situations where parents must leave for their work prior to the bus picking up their children, and
WHEREAS	bus drivers have to be confident that roads are prepared for travel prior to departing for

WHEREAS there must be sufficient spare drivers to support the regular bus drivers in time of need, and

SOLUTION 4-2015 REQUEST FOR OFFSITE ALTERNATE EDUCATION CLASSES Submitted by Montague High Parent Council

WHEREAS this resolution addresses an important issue as it pertains to education, safety and health to many students in the education system, and

WHEREAS the current education system is considering relocating all Alternate Education programs from off-school sites to standard school sites, and

WHEREAS the physical layout of most school facilities is not conducive to an Alternative Education site with a separate entrance, kitchen facility and office/meeting space, and

WHEREAS we need to address and support the students requiring Alternate Education and understand that the need for alternative education program is largely as a result of not being able to attend classes in the current physically structured system for various reasons¹, and

WHEREAS PEI's education system expects Island schools to provide education for all students, including those requiring learning environment adjustments and who are unable to attend regular school, i.e. Alternate Education;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation requests the Minister of Education and Early Childhood Development and English Language School Board designate and allocate all Alternate Education be provided with off-school site facilities to more realistically reflect the needs of those requiring an adjusted learning environment, thereby promoting the total well-being of ALL of our children/youth, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the PEIHSF requests the English Language School Board release an immediate communication plan for the Alternate Education policy to key stakeholders.

Alternative education programs are in place to accommodate the needs of students who are unable to attend regular school usually because of serious social/emotional issues which, after appropriate interventions have been tried, are not able to be managed in the regular school setting. The main focus of the programs is to assist the student in acquiring some life skills training which will enable them to return to the regular school setting. Students are also expected to follow an academic course of studies which parallels as much as possible the academic program they would be following in regular school. Participation in alternative school programs is a short term intervention which aims at return to regular school as soon as possible. The full time programs are staffed by a teacher and a youth worker. "There is no single formula yielding a model that is an ideal 'school for the unsuccessful' "(Raywid, 2001, p. 584). "Despite inclusive schooling and the provision for diversity, mainstream education is not necessarily successful for all students" (de Jong, 2005, p. 363).

WHEREAS current research suggests that poor diet is associated with poor school performanceⁱ, and

WHEREAS in 2012, 35.7% of children in PEI were considered overweight; of these, 13 per cent fell into the higher risk "obese" category, both of which were higher than the Canadian averageⁱⁱ, and

WHEREAS diet quality and obesity have been linked to a number of chronic diseases and higher health care utilization and spendingⁱⁱⁱ Childhood obesity has been shown to have significant negative influences on mental health^{iv}, and

WHEREAS the best approaches to obesity prevention are population and community-based, rather than being the sole responsibility of the individual, and

WHEREAS one in five children in Prince Edward Island live in households affected by some level of food insecurity and 79% of food insecure households were reliant on wages or salaries from employment (as opposed to social assistance, pension or other senior's income, employment insurance, or other). This is the highest rate in Canada^{vi}, and

WHEREAS food bank use in PEI has increased by 18.7% since 2008 and 38% of those helped by Island food banks are children in, and

WHEREAS recent research in Canada has demonstrated a strong link between food insufficiency and poor mental and physical health in childhood, adolescence and adulthood and

WHEREAS PEI children's lunches are consistently of poor quality. The vast majority of Island children are not consuming enough fruits, vegetables and milk and they are consuming less healthy foods too often^{ix}, and

WHEREAS approximately 40% of children's daily caloric intake occurs at school and schools provide an ideal opportunity for learning about nutrition and healthy lifestyles^x, and

WHEREAS lunch programs that rely heavily on parent volunteers contribute to inequalities in access to healthy food across the Island; and, food programs that rely heavily on teachers and school staff reduce the number of hours of instructional time they are able to provide;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the P.E.I. Home and School Federation request the Minister of Education and Early Childhood Development and the Minister of Health and Wellness establish a provincial school lunch program for all Island children that adheres to the school nutrition policies and regulations, and

THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation request the Minister of Education and Early Childhood Development and the Minister of Health and Wellness



ensure that all school lunch programs are developed in collaboration with school communities and encourage and facilitate the use of locally produced food and support local businesses.

I am responding to your correspondence of May 1, 2014 which includes a copy of the resolutions passed at the PEI Home and School Federation's Annual General Meeting. I am providing the following response to eight resolutions:

Resolution 1/8 Participation, Release and Indemnification Forms

The English Language School Board addressed this matter in the 2013-2014 school year. Subsequent to that, the revised student travel forms, which include informed parent consent, were made available to schools in September 2014. The language in the Release and Indemnification Section has been revised to be written as simply as possible while complying with requirements related to the English Language School Board's legal responsibilities for risk management.

Resolution 2/8 E-cigarettes

This resolution requests that the English Language School Board adopt and communicate the former Eastern School District Policy ADC – Tobacco Product Usage Ban.

The operational policies of the former Eastern School District and Western School Board remain in place for schools in their respective jurisdictions until superseded by newly developed policy and procedures of the English Language School Board. This particular matter is currently being addressed.

Resolution 3/8 Remove Administrators, Counsellors and Non-classroom Positions from the Student-teacher Ratio

This resolution, which is related to the reporting of the provincial government's statistics, is directed to the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development for response

Resolution 4/8 Professional Development as it Relates to Academic Achievement

Although this resolution is directed to the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development, the English Language School Board is responsible for the professional development of teachers in its employ and is aware of the importance of teacher professional development being aligned with its strategic plan for student achievement, operational work plans, and school effectiveness goals, as determined by individual schools. The school district considers teacher professional development to be paramount to the improvement of student achievement.

Request for Implementation of Technology in Education Resolution 5/8 Strategic Plan in all Schools in P.E.I.

As noted in this resolution, the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development will implement the third stage of the provincial government's plan to improve the use of technology in schools. Meanwhile, school district representatives will continue to be involved in the development of the Technology in Education Strategic Plan.

Resolution 6/8 **Academic Outcomes**

This resolution is to be considered by the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development.

Resolution 7/8 Student Absenteeism

Schools are concerned about interruptions to and the withdrawal of students from learning time during required instructional hours; the absence of students from various classes during the instructional day; chronic student absenteeism; and student non-attendance. Last year the school district's various leadership teams began to review these challenges and will follow through with plans to address the numerous factors that are affecting required teaching and learning time.

Resolution 8/8 Head Lice

The English Language School Board has implemented operational procedures, consistent with treatment as recommended by health specialists and similar to those in other Canadian school district jurisdictions, regarding pediculosis. Schools in the English Language School Board will continue to collaborate closely with health practitioners and parents/guardians to ensure that families are informed about appropriate procedures to eliminate this problem.

I am writing in response to your letter and resolution regarding e-cigarettes and head lice My response is also on behalf of the Minister of Health & Wellness, Doug Currie

In terms of Resolution # 2-2014 E-Cigarettes, the Department of Health & Wellness is currently reviewing legislation and policies relating to both the Smoke Free Places Act and the Tobacco Sales & Access Act We have also been closely involved in national discussions regarding e-cigarettes and flavored tobacco. Minister Currie has written a letter to the Federal Minister of Health asking for more federal oversight regarding flavored tobacco. Our Office has participated in a virtual symposium on e-cigarettes within the last month with national colleagues including the Chief Medical Officers of Health representing each Province and Territory

In terms of Resolution #8-2014 Head Lice, prior to any English Language School Board policy (ELSB), both myself as Chief Public Health Officer and Kathy Jones, Director of Public Health Programs with Health PEI, met with all principals in the Western and Eastern school districts to provide background and education prior to any school board policy/direction from Department of Education

Prior to the implementation of the ELSB policy, children were missing instructional time. Public Health Nursing, Health PEI, were aware of some children being out of school for extremely lengthy periods due to the presence of nits (> 30 days). As part of the treatment, children should have their hair combed daily and nits removed, but it is not necessary for children to be absent from school due to the presence of a nit as long as they are adhering to the recommended treatment regime. These same policies are in place in other provinces such as Nova Scotia and Ontario and are all based on the recommendations from the Canadian Pediatric Society

Both the Chief Public Health Office and Health PEI support on-going education and working together with parents and teachers to ensure understanding of how to manage head lice (pediculosis), including making sure that proper educational materials are being used Public Health Nursing has in the past, and continues, to provide parent education and support on this issue. They have indicated they are available to present at Home and School meetings, attend meet-the-teacher nights as well as other opportunities. In addition, Public Health Nursing continues to provide parents who contact them with information, education and support. This is a role based on evidence and the experience of other jurisdictions. Public Health Nursing has reformed their role to best meet health needs based on evidence

Some schools/parents may be managing head lice issues more comfortably than others and it may be possible that schools and parents learn from each other with the support of Public Health Nursing. In addition, if the Home & School Federation would like to hear a presentation on the management of head lice, I am sure that could be arranged.

Head lice has always been a challenge If health and education follow the science and evidence, in conjunction with good standards and information, it will help us all manage it better

RE: Amendments to the Tobacco Sales and Access Act and the Smoke-free Places Act

The Department of Health and Wellness, the "Department", as with many health departments and agencies across Canada, is concerned with the growing popularity of electronic smoking devices, "ESDs", such as electronic cigarettes. ESDs contain a cartridge which enables the delivery of a vapourized solution which is then inhaled by the user. The contents of these cartridges is unregulated and may contain nicotine, herbs, flavourings, chemicals and toxins, all of unknown origin and concentration.

Studies show that the use of ESDs is growing rapidly, with 27% of Canadian smokers having tried ESDs in 2013/2014, up from 4% of Canadian smokers in 2010/2011. Experimentation with ESDs is increasing rapidly among young Canadians and there is a concern that ESDs are being used as a gateway product to eventual tobacco use. ESDs are not regulated and the long-term health effects of using ESDs or being exposed to the vapours emitted by ESDs is unknown. Despite the promotion of ESDs as a smoking cessation aid, there is insufficient evidence to support this claim.

In light of the foregoing, the Department intends to amend the *Tobacco Sales and Access Act* to treat ESDs in the same manner as tobacco is treated. The amendment will prohibit the sale of ESDs to persons under the age of 19. In addition, the amendment will impose the same restrictions on the display and advertising of ESDs as is currently applied to tobacco.

Amendments are also forthcoming to the *Smoke-free Places Act* to prohibit the use of ESDs in the same manner that tobacco use is prohibited. This amendment is in response to requests from Islanders for regulation of the use of ESDs in public places and workplaces.

The above-noted amendments are not unique to Prince Edward Island Many other provinces have either implemented or are in the process of implementing similar amendments with respect to the sales, display, advertising, and use of ESDs.

Regarding Resolution 2/14 - E-Cigarettes

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development would support further restrictions on the sale of new tobacco products in PEI

Tobacco education and prevention messages are integrated throughout the grade 1-9 Health curriculum - with a number of learning outcomes across the grades

Informed by the 2010-11 Youth Smoking Survey data (collected as part of SHAPES), the PEI Tobacco Reduction Alliance, Department of Health and Wellness, and the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development have been working together to create a new grade 10 resource on tobacco education and prevention. This resource will be used within the new grade 10 phys ed/wellness curriculum, and will focus on tobacco education, prevention, media awareness, and critical thinking skills. This will build on what students have learned within grade 1-9. It will be ready for the 2014-15 school year.

As this resolution concerns our partners, I will defer the decision on this resolution to the Department of Health and Wellness and the English Language School Board

Regarding Resolution 3/14 - Remove administrators, counselors and non-classroom positions from the student-teacher ratio

While the term student-teacher ratio is often used, the term 'student-educator' ratio is more accurate. The student-teacher ratio differs from class size in that the ratio includes educators who may not be classroom teachers, like resource teachers, guidance teachers, psychologists, principals and vice-principals.

The student-teacher ratio is certainly a factor affecting our school system. However, it is perhaps more important to discuss class sizes and class composition when discussing student achievement. Class sizes and class composition are equally important influences on the learning and teaching environments. One cannot be addressed without the other.

The school boards allocate staff in schools but decisions are often based on individual class size and composition, not on student-educator ratios. The school boards work to improve class size and address the challenges of class composition at the same time. Island class sizes have improved as enrolment declined.

It is important to note that effective teaching strategies and programming outweigh many of the benefits of smaller student-teacher ratios. We are committed to working with school boards to ensure that we are utilizing the skills of these teachers to help support student achievement.

Regarding Resolution 4/14 - Professional development as it relates to academic achievement

Instructional time has to be of high quality in order to really benefit our students. One way to improve the quality of instructional time is to provide professional learning opportunities to teachers, so they can use the most effective instructional strategies with their students. We know high quality teaching is a key factor in supporting student achievement.

The additional embedded professional learning days will support high quality teaching. These professional learning days will provide opportunities for teachers to learn new concepts, meet with other teachers in their school or grade level, try out new concepts in their own classrooms, and evaluate how those concepts are working with their students.

Teachers build on their education and experience through professional learning, so that newly learned skills can take hold, impact classroom practice and positively affect student learning.

Professional learning is not an event. It is an ongoing process. Effective professional learning is an intentional focus on our curriculum, assessment, and instructional strategies in order to improve student learning.

Effective professional learning is embedded in practice; that means that it ensures that there is a direct connection between the teacher's work in the classroom and the professional learning the teacher receives By ensuring that professional learning is embedded, we can be confident that new skills and knowledge are at the centre of teachers' daily work and will have positive outcomes for student learning in classrooms.

Professional learning will help students achieve in the classroom, enable classroom climates to thrive, and prepare all Island children for success in life and in the global workforce

Regarding Resolution 5/14 - Request for implementation of technology in education strategic plan in all schools in PEI

Government recognizes the importance of advanced technology in our education system. This includes investing in the infrastructure to support advanced technology, as well as investing in educational technology to be used by teachers and students

Investments made in education technology have the potential to have a tremendous impact on student achievement and engagement, and to prepare students for success in a technology-based knowledge economy. Because this government recognizes the importance of technology to support student achievement, we have significant investments in technology over the recent years.

Government's first priority for the education technology was to establish a robust education network, one that would give all schools equal access to modern technology now and into the future. The Department is continuing with investments in technology as recommended by the minister's Advisory Committee on Technology. The Department continues to work with ITSS to upgrade servers and routers to increase the access and speed of the education network

Operationally, the Department spends over \$1.0 M in technical support services for our 63 schools including assistance to teachers in use of technology, as well as technology integration with our curriculum in the public school system. Laptop computers were provided to all high school teachers and will continue with the intermediate and elementary teachers.

Educational leaders, students and stakeholders, including teachers and school administration, provided input into the Technology Strategic Plan for K-12 by way of surveys, focus groups and consultations. We will be reviewing the Technology Strategic Plan for K-12 recommendations to develop a plan for the future.

Government is committed to providing the resources necessary to increase student engagement and prepare students for success in a technology-based knowledge economy. We are confident that this Technology Strategic Plan for K-12 will lay the roadmap for the success of our students in the global technological workforce

Regarding Resolution 6/14 - Academic outcomes

The Government of Prince Edward Island is committed to helping Island students thrive, achieve and succeed. We are all here to support our students.

Education is our top priority because it is the best investment government can make in a prosperous economy and a strong society. Student achievement is a high priority for the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development.

We have seen a significant improvement in the average score per student in mathematics and the percentage of students successfully completing the program has jumped considerably. For example, we have seen 12 per cent improvement in the number of students passing the provincial grade 9 assessment, just this past year.

Two new assessments were introduced this year, the Elementary Mathematics Assessment in grade 6 and the Intermediate Literacy Assessment in grade 9, providing base line data. The overall results for 2014 show that the investments we are making in learning are paying off, whether those investments are in literacy coaches, early interventions or professional curriculum resources, and professional development.

Parents and teachers working together, supported by school leaders, school boards, and government, provide the best educational experience for our children.

Parents move issues forward, promote the highest standards for our children and engage government in important dialogues on student achievement. The efforts of parents make our schools a better place to learn and grow, and the work you do ensures parents are aware and involved in their children's learning. The leadership of the Home and School Federation has created meaningful parent engagement which is essential to supporting student achievement

The PEI Home and School Federation continues to play an essential role in our school communities, makes valuable contributions to Island classrooms, supports teachers and school staff. The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development meets with the Home and School Federation at least once a year as a group. The Department also meets with the Executive a number of times per year. The Home and School Federation also sits on some of the Department's committees such as the school calendar committee
