

That Home and School should support the school in its efforts to give children and youth the education they need to become citizens who represent the best in Canadian national life.


That Home and School may question the school policies, but shall not be used as a medium for criticizing or interfering with its authority.

BUSINESS PROCEDURE FOR ANNUAL MEETING

- The Annual General Meeting is conducted in accordance with our Constitution and By-Laws In the case of any procedural dispute, reference shall be made to Parliamentary Procedures which is based on Robert's "Rules of Order".
- 2. Each Local Association may have five voting delegates, all members may attend.
- Each voting delegate shall have one vote provided their Association Membership Fees have been paid to PEIHSF by the Annual Meeting date. Each member of the Federation's Executive and Board of Directors shall also be entitled to one vote.
- 4. Voting shall be by ballot or show of hands. All questions shall be decided by a majority of those voting, except those which require two-thirds (2/3) majority; the President having a deciding vote in case of a tie
- A delegate speaking from the floor shall address the Chair and wait to be recognized. When a sound system is being used, delegates should proceed to a microphone, then wait until the Chair indicates it is their turn to speak.
- 6. A delegate may not speak for more than two minutes on any question under discussion, not more than once on the same question unless requested or permitted by the Chair to clarify a point However, the mover of a motion or resolution shall have the privilege of speaking first to begin discussion and speaking last to close debate.

MEETING TIPS

- Plan to enjoy the meetings. As a representative of your Association, it is your responsibility to help make it a success.
- 2. **This is YOUR Annual Meeting -** You transact the business of the Federation and set the policy to be followed in the coming year for the PEIHSF.
- 3. **Be courteous** to speakers by listening attentively. Avoid private conversations and remain seated when others are speaking.
- 4. **Speaking from the floor** a member wishing to speak from the floor shall address the Chair, give their name in full and the name of the Association represented.
- Do find time to exchange ideas and information Be friendly, mix with delegates from other parts of the province. Don't wait for them to speak first. They may also be a bit shy and a first-time delegate to an Annual Meeting.
- 6. **Say "hello" to your Board of Directors**. They are elected to represent you between Annual Meetings by Association members and they would like to meet you personally.
- 7. **Do take notes** in order that you may report back to your Association, the actions taken, business transacted, ideas and inspirations gained **Share information with your members** knowledge, hand-outs and other material acquired during the AGM.

President Peter Rukavina called the meeting to order at 8:48 a.m

Marion Murphy acted as Parliamentarian Lisa MacDougall acted as Recording Secretary.

President Peter Rukavina introduced the head table, members of the PEI Home and School Federation (PEIHSF) executive in attendance as well as invited guests.

1 Adoption of Agenda 2016

MOTION: That the agenda be approved as presented.

Moved by Shelley Muzika. Seconded by Heather Mullen. MOTION CARRIED.

2. Approval of Annual Meeting Minutes 2015

MOTION: That the minutes of the 2015 Annual General Meeting be approved as presented Moved by Heather Mullen. Seconded by Windsor Wight. **MOTION CARRIED.**

RESOLUTION 1- 2016 SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY Submitted by Alberton Elementary Home and School Association

WHEREAS	social media (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc) are used by students, parents,
	guardians, teachers, administrators and staff to communicate, promote, discuss,
	and share all matter of professional, educational and personal material, and

WHEREAS the nature of social media is, in general, that anything that is posted and shared is available to the general public, forever, and,

WHEREAS the dividing line between the personal and the professional, and the appropriate and the inappropriate, on social media is less clear than in older forms of communication, and

WHEREAS there are not currently policies for the effective, appropriate use of social media by administrators, teachers, staff, students and home and school associations;

THEREFORE IT BE RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation work with the Department of Education, Early Learning and Culture, the PEI Teachers Federation, the Canadian Union of Public Employees education locals, and other education partners to jointly draft a policy for the use of social media, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the goal of the social media policy be to ensure that, to the greatest extent reasonably possible, social media is used in a way that maintains standards of professionalism for educators, that youth are protected from harm, and that the maximum positive educational use can be made of social media tools.

RESOLUTION 2-2016 TEACHING PROFESSION ACT Submitted by Alberton Elementary Home and School Association

WHEREAS Alberta enacted the "Teaching Profession Act" in 2000, British Columbia enacted the "Teaching Profession Act" in 1996, Ontario enacted the "Teaching Profession Act" in 1990,

WHEREAS Prince Edward Island lacks similar legislation;

THEREFORE IT BE RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation collaborate with the Department of Education, Early Learning and Culture and the PEI Teachers Federation to explore the

possible benefits of enacting a similar "Teaching Profession Act" for Prince Edward Island.

RESOLUTION 3-2016 PUBLIC REPORTING AND REMOVAL OF SCHOOL FEES Submitted by PEI Home and School Federation

WHEREAS many schools on Prince Edward Island collect fees from students, including general "student fees," materials fees, school supplies fees, activity fees, extra-curricular activity fees, and field trip and travel fees, and

WHEREAS these fees can place a significant financial burden on Island families, and

WHEREAS the School Act, section 68, guarantees "the right to free school privileges in the public schools of the province" and these fees contravene the spirit of that guarantee, and

WHEREAS in the 2008 Speech from the Throne¹ the government committed to begin the process of removing school fees, and

WHEREAS the nature of school fee collection means that it is difficult or impossible to understand the financial contribution to school through school fees by Island families, and the operational impact of their removal, and

WHEREAS immediately removing these fees would place undue burden on the ability of schools to operate;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation request that Minister of Education, Early Learning and Culture develop a system for reporting to each public

school community, on an annual basis, a summary of the school fees collected in that school, and a summary of how the fees were used, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the PEIHSF requests Minister of Education, Early Learning and Culture use the same information to provide an annual report on school fees summarized for all schools in the province taken together, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the PEIHSF requests the Minister of Education, Early Learning and Culture develop a plan toward the gradual elimination of school fees, ensuring that the pace of elimination does not unduly inhibit the ability of schools to offer curricular and extracurricular activities equitably to all students.

RESOLUTION 4-2016 FRENCH IMMERSION
Submitted by Spring Park Elementary Home and School Association

WHEREAS the percentage of students on PEI in the French Immersion program is 24%,

compared to the national average of 10%1, and

WHEREAS PEI's population is projected to increase from 147,590 in 2016 to 161,792 by 2055², primarily due to net international migration, and

WHEREAS the average percentage increase of students entering the French Immersion program on PEI over the last four years has been roughly 2% per year¹, and

WHEREAS French Immersion offers unique enrichment opportunities that are seriously lacking on PEI, and

WHEREAS there is a tangible benefit of speaking at least one other language as regards global competencies, and

WHEREAS it is challenging to attract and retain high-quality French Immersion teachers to PEI and to maintain a sufficient pool of qualified French Immersion substitute teachers;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation request that the Minister of Education, Early Learning and Culture acknowledge the importance of French Immersion on PEI and develop a strategy to address the increased growth and demand for French Immersion on PEI, specifically:

- Sufficient resources be allocated to support and augment the current recruitment program aimed at attracting and retaining high-quality French Immersion teachers to PEI;
- Ensuring that there is a sufficient pool of qualified French Immersion substitute teachers on PEI;
- Existing French learning materials, including additional resources in school libraries and in the classroom, are augmented;
- Adequate training is provided for French Immersion teachers to maintain French proficiency.

- 2. Ensuring that there is a sufficient pool of qualified French Immersion substitute teachers

- and educational assistants on PEI;
- Existing French learning materials, including additional resources in school libraries and in the classroom, are augmented;
- Adequate training is provided for French Immersion teachers and educational assistants to maintain French proficiency

MOTION: To approve Resolution 4-2016 as amended. Moved by Sheldon Opps. Seconded by Tracy Ellsworth. **MOTION CARRIED**

LATE RESOLUTION 5-2016 AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATORS Submitted by Queen Elizabeth Home and School Association

WHEREAS the Heart and Stroke Foundation reports that up to 40,000 cardiac arrests occur each year in Canada (one cardiac arrest every 12 minutes) and without rapid and appropriate treatment, most of these cardiac arrests will result in death, and

WHEREAS thousands of lives could be saved through public access to automated external defibrillatorsⁱ, and

WHEREAS when an automated external defibrillator and CPR are immediately available, the chance of survival from sudden cardiac arrest is substantially improved¹, and when combined with CPR, the use of an automated external defibrillator may increase the likelihood of survival by 75% or moreⁱⁱ, and

WHEREAS for every one minute delay in defibrillation, the survival rate of a cardiac arrest victim decreases by 7 to 10%, and after more than 12 minutes of ventricular fibrillation, the survival rate is less than 5% iii, and

WHEREAS response time data for October, November and December of 2015 published by Health PEI reports the median response times in minutes (an average of these times shows Souris as 10:22, Montague as 10:12, Charlottetown as 7:31, Summerside as 8:20, O'Leary as 9:15 and Alberton as 12:09^{iv}), and

WHEREAS the estimated total number of students and staff present at island schools daily amounts to 21,242, and

WHEREAS automated external defibrillators are simple devices requiring little maintenance and can be safely and effectively used by trained and even untrained users, and

WHEREAS our schools are buildings vital to our communities and as such are used day to day after school hours by groups and organizations other than students and staff for meetings, sporting events and extracurricular activities, and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation requests that the Departments of Education and Health provide funds to place and maintain automated external defibrillators in each school across PEI, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation requests that the Ministers of Education, Early Learning and Culture and Health and Wellness provide funds and establish a system to

ensure that at least 50% of the staff at each school on PEI has current CPR and First Aid training at all times.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND HOME AND SCHOOL FEDERATION Lisa MacDougall, President

The primary goals of the Federation during my first year as President have been to support our local home and school associations through the changes in education governance and to advocate for a universal provincial school food program. Resting on the efforts of past presidents in building a spirit of collaboration among education partners, we have worked to ensure that the voices of all members of school communities, including parents, guardians, teachers, administrators and staff are included in the discussion around education. As always, we have held the well-being of all Island children at the centre of our work.

Over the past year, I watched with interest and pride as local home and school associations, united home and school associations and school communities voiced their thoughts, feelings and ideas during the school review process I met with government and community organizations to discuss education governance and collaboration. And I watched with increasing excitement as interest and enthusiasm grew to what can only be called a movement around school food.

School Review

In June 2015, prior to my term as president, the PEI Home and School Federation submitted feedback on the <u>Proposed Board Governance Policy - School Change</u>, which was formally adopted by English Language School Board formally adopted the policy at its meeting on October 27, 2015

At the request of the PEI Home and School Federation, a new clause, 12, was added: "The English Language School Board recognizes that schools are interconnected with the communities that surround them and close relationships between home, school and community positively affect public education."

District Advisory Councils

At the final ELSB board meeting on June 14, I presented a brief history and purpose of school boards and school trustees in PEI and Canada, emphasizing the important role of citizen engagement in education Since then, we have met several times with the Minister and Deputy Minister to discuss Department plans for addressing unequal distribution of resources among Island schools, the membership of the District Advisory Councils, and the public consultations around restructuring

In the summer of 2016, we engaged our regional directors, who sit on the Advisory Councils, in an exercise to reflect on the progress of the Councils up to that point, with an eye to making recommendations on the way forward. Based on this exercise, and grounded in our 60 year experience in engaging home and school in conversation, we presented five recommendations to the Deputy Minister in August 2016: that the members of each District Advisory Council be involved in the decision making process about how the meetings are structured, including decisions about meeting facilitation, recording methods, and publication; that the members of each District Advisory Council have input into the creation of the agenda for each meeting; that the members of each District Advisory Council be given

the option of requesting that the meetings be chaired or co-chaired by the PEIHSF Regional Representative on that District Advisory Council; that any key messages and minutes must be agreed upon by members of each of the District Advisory Councils prior to their publication; that the representative to the District Advisory Council from each school be chosen by that school's Home & School Association or Parent Council, and that the eligibility for the representative continues to be the broad pool of parents, guardians, teachers, administrators and staff that make up each home and school association.

Our emphasis throughout this process has been on building on the spirit of collaboration that has been the heart of the PEI Home and School Federation for over sixty years. In support of these efforts, four home and school members were awarded the Dr. Helen MacDonald Collaboration and Facilitation Scholarship and have received their certifications in Collaborative Leadership and Facilitation from UPEI. They are now prepared to assist local home and schools define their education priorities, develop community networks around school food programs, and facilitate discussions about other projects.

Universal Provincial School Food Program

The second focus of the Federation since the AGM, and for the past 2 years, has been to implement a strategy to bring a universal healthy school lunch program to Prince Edward Island children. We have been participating in ongoing discussions with the Public Schools Branch, the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, local home and school associations and other stakeholders about the benefits and opportunities around a school lunch strategy for the province. An update on our progress can be found on the peihsf ca website.

It is our expectation that pilot projects will be running in several schools by September 2017. In expectation of this, we have developed the Guiding Principles for School Food in PEI that will be voted on at the 2017 AGM. It is our hope that the Prince Edward Island provincial school lunch strategy will be a model for how all stakeholders in education can be brought together to promote their shared values for the benefit and wellbeing of all Island children. Let's do the right thing.

Our Excellent and Dedicated Staff

Our work as a Federation could not happen without the work of our dedicated staff: Executive Director, Shirley Jay and administrative support person Cherie LeMoine. Over the past hear they have fielded hundreds of telephone calls and emails, organized meetings, collated minutes, engaged in research to support the board, and undertaken countless other tasks. We all owe them a great debt for their devotion to their work.

Credit must also go to the members of our provincial board: the executive, and our regional directors (one for each family of schools) who have worked together to ensure that the Federation continues to prosper Please take a moment to thank them for volunteering their time and energy.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2016

(UNAUDITED)

1. MISSION

PEI Home and School Federation Inc. is a not-for-profit organization incorporated under the laws of the Province of Prince Edward Island. The Federations principal activities include the promotion of the total well-being of children and the highest standards of education for each child in the Province. The Federation works in partnership with other organizations who foster this ideal. The Federation encourages and whenever possible assists in the development of policies related particularly to quality education for each child and generally to the total well-being of children in Prince Edward Island.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

a) Revenue recognition

(i) Grants and members dues

Grants and members dues are recognized proportionately over the fiscal year to which they relate Revenues received in advance of the fiscal year to which they relate are recorded as deferred revenue

(ii) Investment income

Investment income comprises interest from term deposits. Revenue is recognized on an accrual basis

b) Donated services

The work of the Federation is dependent on the voluntary service of many individuals Since these services are not normally purchased by the Federation and because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, donated services are not recognized in the financial statements

c) Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the current period. Actual results may differ from the estimates, the impact of which would be recorded in future periods

d) Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are not capitalized, but are expensed in the year they are purchased

3. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Federation is exposed to various risks through financial instruments, such as cash, investments, accounts payable and accrued liabilities

Credit risk

Cash and investments: Credit risk associated with cash and Canadian fixed income investments is minimized by ensuring that these assets are invested in guaranteed investment certificates

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Federation will not be able to meet a demand for cash or fund its obligations as they come due.

The Federation meets its liquidity requirements by anticipating investing and financing activities and holding assets that can readily converted into cash

Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices Market risk is comprised of currency risk, interest rate risk and other price

interest rate risk

The Federations cash includes amounts on deposit with financial institutions that earn interest at market rates

Changes in risk

There have been no significant changes in the Federations risk exposures from the previous year

P.E.I. HOME AND SCHOOL FEDERATION Office Report: Shirley Smedley Jay, Executive Director

History is not only for looking backward, but also for looking forward!

The following is an excerpt from a record of Home and Schools's first twenty years: *History 1953-1973* - *The Prince Edward Island Federation of Home and School Associations*, compiled by the late Hesta MacDonald, President 1965-1967. This publication was made possible through a grant from the Prince Edward Island 1973 Centennial Commission.

Education needs were very pressing in P.E.I during those years when parents and teachers were forming a provincial federation in an effort to better the school system. Many changes and improvements have come about in the past two decades, but major changes do not occur overnight. (Pg. 35)

On March 6, 1962, the President, Eric Kipping, and other members of provincial executive presented a brief to the members of the Legislature, pinpointing five areas of greatest need in education in the province *Teacher Training * Adult Education * Public Health Services * Libraries * Vocational Guidance (Pg 36)

The PEI Home and School Federation's mission is to exist to promote the total well-being of children and the highest standards of education for each child in the province. I am asked questions that are directly linked to the mission and how do "we" carry out this mission. The provincial office, in cooperation with board members, offers advice and services to local members in a variety of ways.

Communication - Post mail is circulated September 1st and February 15th; electronic mailings monthly with reminders issued on a needs basis. The September mailing contains information for the president (memo/calendar), treasurer (membership fee form) and secretary (contact info sheet). The PEIHSF website is kept up-to-date with resources, calendars and current Home and School news.

Leadership Training Workshop – Training sessions are held the end of September for new and old members. Register to learn more about how to effectively run your local Home and School.

Semi-Annual – A bi-annual meeting, held in October, will provide updates on current educational activities within the Federation and PEI's education system.

Resolutions – Consider issues for change in December Educational matters requiring change are to be considered and submitted to the Federation by January 31st. We can help! Contact the office to find out how to write a resolution

Awards – The Federation recognizes special people in our system in a number of ways. Our annual award program includes: Extra Mile Awards are presented to two teachers and/or staff; Volunteer Award recognizes one Home and School individual annually; Life Member is presented to an individual who has contributed locally and provincially to Home and School, when appropriate; School Bus Driver

Award presents two recognitions in June and a School Crossing Guard also in June.

Parent Leadership grants – Funding is offered to support educational sessions for parents where they can learn how to better support their child's learning. Submit applications November 30th. These will be reviewed by mid-December. There were thirteen projects reviewed and awarded funding for 2016-17. Projects covered topics: helping parents with cyber bullying and mental health issues, equipping parents with tools to help their children with numeracy, events where parents and students explore the world of art, and food—where it comes from, how to prepare it and education around healthy eating at home and in school

Smoking Prevention – The total health and well being of children and youth is part of our mission. The PEI Tobacco Reduction Alliance and Council For a Smoke Free PEI are refocusing on prevention efforts – aimed at youth! Cessation has been much of previous year's efforts. Prevention is key with more tobacco-like products on the market. Electronic cigarettes have 7000 flavours being offered to consumers which include youth. Legalization and regulation of cannibus is being discussed with a focus on protecting the young. Collaboration and Facilitation - Learning the skills for collaborating and facilitating more effectively has been the focus of the Dr Helen MacDonald Scholarship recipients. These newly trained facilitators will be offering assistance to local associations. If you are looking for help with running meetings and how to tackle issues in a constructive manner in your Home and School, contact the Federation.

Today, the Home and School history is written by local Home and School presidents and co-chairs in the form of annual reports. These are inserted in the Federation's Annual Book of Reports. Together we are writing the history of Home and School in Prince Edward Island. Be sure to read these rich stories told by members from our school communities.

The goals of the PEI Home and School Federation work to support and encourage the whole school community's engagement in PEI's education system for the purpose of encouraging students to achieve their personal best. This year's school review process has shown that working together, as a team in our school communities, is best. Together we can learn how to interact within the education system to provide the best possible learning experience for children and youth in PEI

Much gratitude goes to Lisa MacDougall, PEIHSF president and board members for their dedicated service to the school community – for children and youth in this province. Many hours of meetings take place where current educational affairs are discussed and carefully thought through with decisions made that always have all Island childrens' benefit in mind. I wish to thank our office support person, Cherie LeMoine, for her dedicated work over the past year on the many office tasks that are handled with care and respect.

Meeting Topics for Discussion:

Discussion around healthy cell phone use and student mental health took place. Initiatives already organized with presenters were shared. Sharing of information about the PEI Home and School Federation's Semi-Annual Meeting, which focused on healthy eating, was also a topic. However, much of the focus this year has been linked to the Public School Branch's "Review of Schools". We felt that this review process was going to greatly impact the school culture and population at Birchwood and, as a result, wanted to prioritize our focus, time and energy in advocating for the students and staff at Birchwood Intermediate School.

This Year's Focus:

Based on our focus and possible upcoming changes to the school zoning which would greatly affect Birchwood, we approached the issues during meetings in the following way:

Firstly, we received feedback from our parent representative Angus Orford, who is Birchwood's representative on the District Advisory Council He was able to share with us concerns that were raised at their meetings as well as a joined meeting of representatives from both the Charlottetown Rural Family of Schools and the Colonel Gray Family of Schools Many discussions took place around concerns that Birchwood Home and School has communicated to government for the last several years.

Secondly, we felt it was imperative to respond to certain media clips which portrayed Birchwood in a negative slant. At the time, we believed the best way to do this was to present accurate and positive information about the student population at Birchwood, as well as many of the attributes of the school's location and facilities. We thought that a presentation at the first Colonel Gray Family of Schools meeting in the School Review Process was a great avenue to accomplish this goal. Many members of our Council contributed greatly to the assembly of material for the presentation

We also submitted a formal letter to the Board outlining our perspectives on the need for rezoning in order to address the consistent and dramatic declining enrollment at Birchwood, as well as the overpopulation issues at Stonepark. Other issues that we addressed included making education opportunities more equitable for all students in PEI through equal access to resources. In the near future, a concern and focus we would like to address is making any new Birchwood students and their families feel welcome at Birchwood. Additionally, we would also like to help ease the transition for current students at Birchwood, as they will also likely be impacted by recommendations which will lead to a dramatic increase in the student population at Birchwood. One idea discussed was to organize a public open house at Birchwood. We are waiting on final decisions to be made by the School Review Board to make plans for further steps.

There have been many changes in our education system in the last couple of years. Our Parent Council is very proud of our school and of the efforts and achievements of our students and staff. This pride is the basis of our motivation to support Birchwood in whatever ways we can

This is the first year for the Home and School Association at Colonel Gray since 1998-1999, and we are very pleased with the interest from the parent group as well as the cooperation from the school administration. The parent group met a couple of times last fall to confirm the structure and goals of the association and discuss emerging issues for the school population. It was decided that we would not be a fundraising organization but rather focus on the relationship with the school and parent organization as well as sharing of information, discussion on how it currently works, and ideas for improving the education and school experience for the students.

The school administration has worked closely with the new parent Home and School group and has been very supportive of the new association. One of the initial goals was to improve communication of school activities to the parent population. The principle now sends an update on a monthly basis through SAS of the current month's events and activities. As well, changes have been implemented to better educate parents and students on the POD system for the school population.

Colonel Gray students had the benefit of having Toni Geraci visit the school in November to talk to students about school lunch programs. Chef Toni Garcia visited Colonel at the end of October and met with the principal to discuss a new approach to food in the schools and to offer some suggestions on easy and healthy changes that could be implemented in the cafeteria. He also met with about 100 students including both culinary classes and sampled some of the food that they prepared. Students were happy to give their opinions and share their vision for the equity of food in society and how we can increase the quality of the food we eat.

As part of their well being goals, Colonel Gray was instrumental in having Dr Stan Kutcher come to PEI to speak to the Colonel Gray students about stress and strategies to handle it. He also tried to clarify some of the terminology as it relates to mental distress, anxiety, depression, mental illness, etc. Dr Kutcher also did 2 presentations to parents about the same topics. Improving student mental health and student well-being was also a goal of the parent group. Colonel Gray and the Police Association of PEI invited Dr. Stan Kutcher to present to parents and students in January providing an overview of mental health issues in young people (stress, anxiety, developing coping skills and strategies, etc.) and common language needed to effectively deal with mental health promotion, prevention and care.

Colonel Gray was the site chosen to pilot BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) in December They gathered information and technical data and to work out the technical issues to make this possible on a go forward basis. Colonel Gray will be producing "The Little Mermaid" this year at the Confederation Centre, a major undertaking. The students and teachers involved have made a huge commitment which is much appreciated as the experience is wonderful for the students involved. Much of the work of this new organization in the initial stages has been providing feedback to the District Advisory representative for the school review process. With the Category II School Change recommendations committee and public presentations taking up a lot of time for parents, it has been more difficult to work on the specific issues at the Colonel Gray School. The amount of time parents have put into this process as well as the presentations at the public meetings has been much appreciated and truly showed the interest in improving the education system for our students.

Communications:

A key role of our Englewood Home and School Association is to serve as a point of communication between parents and teachers/staff, as well as among parents themselves. To that end, we maintain an active Home and School Association Facebook page. We find that this is an excellent tool to share information about school events, promote our Home and School Association, and provide a forum for parents and staff to communicate.

Following the province-wide threat to schools in September 2016, many parents had questions and concerns about emergency response procedures. Englewood Home and School Association hosted a well attended meeting to allow school administrators to brief parents on what took place and the changes that will be made to deal with future threats.

Initiatives:

Englewood Home and School Association continues to offer a hot lunch program, with lunches offered 3 days/week and milk offered 5 days/week. The Monday and Wednesday lunches are purchased from Bev Campbell and a Home and School Association volunteer picks up the food in Kensington. Parents and students appreciated having the option of a hot lunch and the online ordering system adopted in 2015 has been well received.

Other food initiatives from Englewood Home and School Association include the operation of a canteen at the school which is stocked with a small variety of healthy snacks. We are also pleased to offer a healthy snack to students once per week throughout the school year. Home and School volunteers prepare the snack at the school on Tuesday mornings and deliver it to each classroom. This program introduces children to foods that they may not be exposed to at home and the "peer pressure" of the new food being introduced in the classroom enhances the uptake. Many children have asked their parents for the new treat at home, so the recipes for the snacks have been posted on our Facebook page.

Our Home and School Association likes to limit fundraising, but we do try to ensure that there is some money each year allocated for special purchases at the school. The Association asks the teachers/administrators where money is most needed. In 2017, we are providing money to the school's band program. Instruments are expensive and there are always some needing repair and replacement.

Participation in Provincial Home and School Activities:

• This year, unfortunately, due to weather there was only one school day in which students and teachers were in attendance A hot meal and dessert was provided on this day for all teachers/staff at GES. Due to the inability to complete teacher/staff appreciation week, our group will be providing supper to teachers/staff at the next set of parent teacher interviews in March

Benefits to Students from Efforts:

- Our lunch program has grown from as few as 6 regular orders to 16 regular and, depending on the meal, as many at 28. Our menu rotates through 8 options which include spaghetti and garlic bread, grilled cheese, corn chowder, chili, chicken wraps, chicken burgers, perogies and sausages, baked potato and once a month homemade pizza. Prices range from \$2-\$3.50 to make sure everyone can participate.
- Students have had several free pancake breakfasts alongside our breakfast club program
- Our Home and School Association worked alongside the teachers of our school to have our annual Christmas Fair. This night included many games, activities and prizes for not just only our school community but it is also a staple night for the community of Georgetown. The night is a successful fundraiser for our school
- Our students travelled to Great Northern Adventures in Mount Herbert for an outdoor day of sledding, sleigh rides and other winter activities
- Go Play! PEI is a program that ran for 15 weeks after school two nights a week that provided physical exercise for our children. It was very successful and enjoyed by all students.
- The Bricks for Kids program will be starting the next couple of weeks for our children. It was a huge success last year and the children are extremely excited for it to begin again. With our

- fundraised efforts the cost of this program will partially be covered by the Home and School Association.
- Georgetown Elementary has continued its connection with the Kings Playhouse this year with a
 number of vibrant outreach activities. For the second year in a row, students in grades 7 and 8
 were invited to engage with Remembrance Week programming. Students served as ushers for
 the Main stage performance of 'Waiting for the Parade' (a play by Canadian playwright John
 Murrell) as well as singers, readers and flag bearers for the community Remembrance Day
 ceremony.
- In December, students took part in 'A Community Christmas Concert ' on the stage at the Playhouse. The performance invited students to sing solos, dance and perform as an ensemble.
- In March, the Home and School partnered once again with the Kings Playhouse to engage a workshop for the entire school with Bboyizm Dance Company (an Ottawa based professional dance company). The dancers facilitated workshops for the entire school.
- Plans are well underway for the Eastern Kings Drama Festival, a portion of which will be performed at the Kings Playhouse as well as the annual Variety Concert. Collaboration between the school and the Playhouse is a tremendously meaningful one, and access to diverse arts and culture within walking distance has made it possible for our children to access the arts in incredible ways.

School Review Process:

- The vast majority of our year has been spent putting countless amounts of hours putting together presentations, strategizing, fundraising and attending all meetings regarding the Category II School Review. Georgetown Elementary is again recommended for closure, and we as a Home and School Association have been trying everything we can to prevent a closure from happening.
- We have attended all five meetings in each family of schools involved in this review and also have spoken at a majority of them. We as a group feel as though our education systems need to be reviewed and that closures should not be step one of solving the problems.

Glen Stewart continues to have an active school community. We have a very busy breakfast program that has parents in every day to help out. Parent Volunteers also help with the two big book fairs we have during parent teacher interviews; with 33 classes, it can be very busy so the parent volunteers are a must to have them run smoothly.

Fundraisers this year consist of fall and summer coupon books, Christmas craft fair and spring fling. Christmas craft fair and spring fling are huge events that require a lot of planning; and to facilitate this, we have two separate committees to have them run smoothly. Many parent volunteers are required for these events. We await the final report, but plan to continue our efforts in conjunction with Stratford Elementary and the Town of Stratford to relieve the overcrowding situation in our schools.

Hernewood Special meeting Regarding Westisle Family of Schools Review

There were 14 present including parents, teachers and staff. A brief summary of the meeting follows:

- The changes for education in general are happening too fast: Going from English Language School board to Public Schools Branch-having elected board members then going to an appointed 3 person board as the new Public School Board. Then we move immediately into a school review without even figuring out who does what
- Those present felt it was important to maintain grades 7 9 at Hernewood Intermediate
- Special programs offered such as industrial arts classes, science labs and home economics, green space and a huge library are a few of the many positive things at Hernewood Intermediate
- There are 3 languages offered at Hernewood—English, French, and Mi'kmaq
- The school helps to promote cultural diversity in rural PEI
- Location of Hernewood is central to Alberton, O'Leary, Bloomfield and Elmsdale
- Great resource located next door that the school will use often for physical education at the Rodd Mill River Resort and Aqua Plex, Golf course and Ski Shop Students can easily participate in after school activities that are offered through West Prince Sports Council such as swimming, skiing, golf, tennis, beach volleyball and canoeing/kayaking.
- The cross country zones and provincials are hosted at the Mill River Provincial Park Campground and the Hernewood leadership students help to facilitate the event.
- Hernewood school is used for many things and by many organizations such as:
 West Prince Sports Council; Go PEI events such as Try Archery, Try Pickle Ball to name a few;
 East Prince Basketball; West Prince Basketball; West Prince Soccer; Men's Adult Soccer;
 Hockey teams for off-ice training camps; political conventions; and community cooking classes
 to name a few.
- Hernewood hosts many elementary school tournaments as the elementary school gymnasiums are not big enough to host these events. There are badminton and basketball tourneys to name a few and Special Olympics are held at Hernewood.

General Comments/Points

- Most expressed concern at the time frame given for feedback--a very short period for something as important as the future of our schools in West Prince
- Hernewood described as the "UGLY MIDDLE CHILD SYNDROME" where the junior highs, both Hernewood and Callaghan, are not located within an amalgamated area.
- Rural PEI has limited employment opportunities as it is; the decision to close a school will definitely come with job losses.
- Comments from parents regarding possibility of Grade 9 going to Westisle:
 - 1 Too young; exposed to too much too early.
 - 2 Down-right dangerous; social impact; prey on the young
 - 3. Impact on sports teams
- Population increases in West Prince-increase from Albertans returning home to PEI; immigrants and temporary foreign workers marrying and having children in Western PEI.
- Concern about combined classes was brought up if there was a K 8 model introduced
 - 1. What would the numbers be?

- 2 Would we see more combined classes if we closed Junior High and went to elementary schools with K to 8.
- It was noted that Hernewood could accommodate elementary students and, if needed, there could be some type of barricade put up to separate 2 wings for elementary and junior high students.
- The question of viable options? What in Rural PEI would take over a facility of this size after a new manor in Alberton being built and the hospitals renovated. Hernewood is a fantastic facility with lots to offer. A viable option for this school if it closes would be tough.
- The Mik'mag students are funded with federal dollars so there is a partnership that exists already
- There was much discussion on forming a united front asking for at least a one- year moratorium on closing any schools. There seems to be a real rush being put on the process and a suggestion could be to slow down. Local Home and Schools are starting to form a group called "West Prince United Home and School".
- A statement was made that there is definitely an immediate need to fix the overcrowding problem in Charlottetown schools; however, there is no immediate do or die fix required for the Westisle Family of Schools.
- A point was raised as to whether there is any way that one man "Bob Andrews" could consult with and weigh all the possibilities being presented and seek input from other government departments that may have an impact on the numbers in his report or the direction the government is going. Development boards and community councils, etc.; their input is required. Whose job is it to get their input if those development boards aren't getting involved in this process?
- There was much conversation early on about perhaps a way to disrupt the STATUS QUO because that seems to be the catch phrase that the "STATUS QUO IS NOT AN OPTION." Maybe Westisle family of schools status quo change could be the introduction of other services in our schools. There was a report in 2012 with specific recommendations for child and youth services in PEI. Recommendation #6 describes developing a pilot in rural PEI schools. If we offer more family services and health services in our schools, there could be a reallocation of resources that would follow the services that would benefit our children and their families in our local schools.

The school has purchased a new Literacy Program. We were asked to help purchase the new program by the school. We feel this is an excellent program to help children struggling with literacy.

Miscouche Home and School has an open door policy and welcomes any and all new and returning members to join us for a monthly meeting sometime. We are continuing to build on the positive momentum we have going; and, as always, our goal is to be a positive voice for our children in the school community.

For the 2016-17 school year, we set out with a goal to have something at the school each month to engage parents and families and have them out to the school more often.

We have hosted 2 sessions of the Triple P Parenting program, with a third installment to come in April. These sessions have been well attended, and we have received some fantastic feedback by attendees.

In the fall we hosted a fun family night, Fall Frolic It was near Halloween, so gave children a chance to come in their costumes. We had a huge turnout with a lot attending from other schools and communities to join in the fun.

For the spring, we plan to have our spring fair, as we have in the past, and the end of the year bbq where we provide hot dogs and juice for lunch for every child in the school

We have also discussed a family math game night to host with the school in the near future

The last book fair held at the school, we gave each teacher \$20 to spend on books or supplies for their classroom. We had a huge discount table where a lot of books were marked down to \$2.50 so some teachers really got quite a bit for the class!

Our breakfast program is thriving with monthly donations from the Rotary Club of Montague. We are serving approx 75-100 children per day. The menu varies from cereal, to toast, muffins, fruit, smoothies and juice

Our lunch program is also doing well, and we are continuing to use the Hot Lunch program

Due to weather, our teacher appreciation pot luck has been moved to February 28th. We also treated all staff to a \$5 Tim's card each, and coffee and baked goods

We are currently working with the school on achieving their yearly goals on mindset and virtues.

This year our meeting discussions have been dominated by the current school reviews While we are not directly affected by any of the proposed changes, we do not support any rural schools closing, East or West, and we have had conversations with the Georgetown Home and School president, Mallory Peters

Susie is our DAC rep and keeps us well informed after their meetings as well.

MCS Proposal for Change

Educational Factors:

- MCS has a student population of roughly 420 students
- Studies show that an optimal size for elementary school is 300-350 students. This allows for better utilization of resources within the school, including manageable class sizes for homerooms and specialized classes such as physical education and music
- By being the zone for Early Immersion for the Montague family of schools, our school has a unique school community drawing students from Little Pond, Flat River and all points in between

Demographic Factors:

- In the past five years, MCS has seen a significant shift in enrollment in the early French immersion program.
- In 2011, our school population was 60% English and 40% immersion
- In 2016, that has shifted to be 35% English and 65% immersion
- While the reason for this shift is unknown, we do believe that parents value a second language for their children's future.
- Because the Montague family of schools does not offer late immersion, parents feel that it is NOW or NEVER
- Over 40% of the French Immersion population is being drawn from outside the Montague Consolidated school zone

Transportation Factors:

- MCS shares the school busses with MIS and MRHS. Because of the number of children coming in from outside the zone, we rely on the high school busses to deliver students to and from school every day.
- While the bus system, like any, could likely use room for improvement, it is a system that is already in place because of our centralized location.

Proposed Options for Change:

- 1 Reconfigure the grades within MCS, MIS and MRHS allowing best utilization of space in these 3 facilities using an optimal service model of 350 students for K-8.
- 2. Offer late immersion as an option in Grade 7, giving parents and students an equal opportunity for a second language
- 3 Dedicate additional resources to deal with Mental Health & Wellness in elementary schools, focusing on early intervention for students at risk in primary, continued support of the A+ Program for grades 4-6, and work with other government departments to decrease wait times for assessments and testing tools as required

Implications of Proposed Change:

- Reconfiguring the grades between MCS, MIS and MRHS will allow for a better service model for program delivery in all schools. Then impact on the students and parents is minimal as all students will continue to receive their education in Montague.
- Offering Late Immersion allows parents to choose to keep their children in their community schools from K-6. This will continue to grow the population of the remaining schools in our family of schools and allows an equal opportunity for education for all. The impact on MCS may see a shift back towards more English students and less French immersion students, which will allow administration to properly allocate resources
- Additional resources for mental health issues are a must. We are living in a society where mental health issues are being developed at a very early age. Focusing on resources and intervention at an early age should be less taxing on the system as a whole in later years. The implications of more mental health resources are only positive. As government makes its final decisions on the Montague Family of Schools, please realize that moving children with anxiety and other issues out of smaller schools and into bigger schools will only develop more mental health issues. If changes are made, resources MUST follow the changes

Montague Intermediate Hosts World Renowned Chef, Tony Geraci

In mid-October, Montague Intermediate was lucky enough to be afforded the privilege of hosting world renowned American chef, Tony Geraci. As part of Montague Intermediate's Healthy Snack" program, Tony participated in a round table discussion with students responsible for the program delivery

Each week students and the Home Economics teacher, Sarah Macintosh, discuss what healthy snacks students would enjoy, what is available, and the economics of providing choices. In recent years we have received wonderful support from the Horticultural Society of Prince Edward Island, The Healthy Eating Alliance, and from the Montague Branch of Rotary. Regularly on our menu are root vegetables such as carrots, turnip, and Kohlrabi, along with cauliflower and broccoli. Depending on what is for sale we also have red and green bell peppers, tomatoes, strawberries, grapes, pineapple, apples, pears and plums.

Students shop at the local grocer for those items on sale and which are not delivered weekly. They are responsible for the preparation, presentation, and clean-up each week. The cost is one dollar for a good sized portion. Students are given a zip-lock bag and can mix and match food stuffs as they prefer

What is intriguing about this healthy snack program is that it is right in line with what Chef Tony Geraci has become so famous for which is self-sustaining healthy food stuffs for children in school. In his discussion with students he talked about growing their own food, preparation, and financial responsibility in keeping the program alive. In his experience in the United States he shared how giant conglomerates produced cheap quality food and widened profit margins at the expense of healthy children. He was very pleased with the Montague "Healthy Snack" program and commended students on their efforts to promote such a program.

Chef Tony spent an hour discussing alternative means to providing healthy lunch choices and hoped that we as leaders in this area would support the provincial government in taking action to become self-sustaining. He demonstrated how Prince Edward Island had the right people, the small close knit communities, and the opportunities to involve local farmers, food producers, the fishery and local grocers. His conversations lead students to open up their minds to endless healthy eating possibilities at a reasonable cost.

After our students spoke, Chef Tony and the Principal, Kevin Stonefield, continued on with an earlier conversation and discussed barriers, road blocks, and limitations that have to be challenged Both

agreed there was an appetite for healthier eating and that the Montague "Healthy Snack" program was a living and breathing example of a success story from which the rest of the province could learn

Both agreed that the provincial government and the Public Schools Branch need to take a hard look at the current model that services our students and really question who it serves. Government has to be prepared to take a little financial loss to support a better healthy eating strategy that subsidizes better food in our schools. The payoff is a healthier Island with less need for medical care. Short term financial expense for long term health gain

Chef Tony Geraci left with an open invitation to come back and participate in the school's healthy choices

As always, staff and students at QCIS are busy with extra-curricular activities that foster personal and learning growth beyond the classroom: Duke of Edinburgh Program (first graduates of Bronze level in May, 2016), band concerts, sporting activities, school and band trips, guest speakers, and peer mentoring opportunities.

Queen Elizabeth Elementary Home and School Association (QEES) is very proud to be able to share with you how we have been working in our school and community.

We started our year on August 31, 2016, prior to the first day of school. In mid August we became aware that our school, along with East Wiltshire, would not have the asbestos ceiling tiles removed before the beginning of the 2016-2017 school year and quickly requested a meeting with government and education representatives. Our association and parents wanted to know why our school was not being remediated with the others and, most importantly, wanted to ensure that QEES provides a safe, healthy learning environment for our student and staff.

We met with Parker Grimmer and Dave Gillis in a meeting open to all parents on August 31, 2016, in advance of our general meeting. This meeting revealed that due to the high prevalence of asbestos tiles, the remediation would take an estimated 8 weeks. An underestimation of the scope of the project resulted in there not being enough time to complete the job before school started

Mr. Grimmer and Mr Gillis assured us that our school was indeed safe for our staff and students and that planning would be in place to have the asbestos tiles removed as soon as the 2016-17 school year ended. They also agreed to complete air quality testing on a couple of occasions throughout the school year to monitor the safety of our school. These tests have been completed and have come back with good results. Our Breakfast Program has continued for a successful third year. Every school day, volunteers, led and organized by Bev Campbell, provide a healthy breakfast for every student who wants to attend. Thanks to grants and donations, the Breakfast Program is currently providing fresh fruit, toast, cheese, and twice a week, eggs

In addition to providing healthy breakfasts for our students, QEES is very proud to have been able to continue a hot lunch program as well. Healthy, home-made lunches are prepared four days a week by Chef and Home and School Vice President Bev Campbell. Parents and caregivers order their children's meals on a monthly basis using our online ordering system. Lunch options range from soup, to casseroles, to ham and scalloped potatoes, with 'fun' meals such as pizza and hot dogs available on Fridays. All food is cooked onsite and feedback from students, parents and staff alike has been nothing but positive. As an added bonus, a small portion of the cost of each meal is donated back to the school. Volunteer Tawnia Craig has continued to do baked potatoes for lunch on Wednesdays, completing our week of healthy lunches and also functioning as an ongoing fundraiser for the Home and School.

In order to try to be environmentally responsible the Home and School purchased a set of reusable dishes for the hot lunch program. These dishes are being rolled out gradually but will allow us to dramatically decrease our disposable product use by the end of the school year.

Another initiative our Home and School has been able to continue this year is a program that we call *It Takes a Town* (ITAT). This year we have 6 families, containing 27 people, enrolled in the program. Totes, containing on a rotating basis items such as bread, pasta and sauce, condiments, rice, fruit, potatoes and other vegetables, are packed and delivered by the committee on the last school day of each week Recently, a partnership has been formed with the Kensington Lions Club to be able to continue to provide this support to our families.

There have been a few successful fundraisers organized by the Home and School this year. Our annual Flea Market just before the Christmas Break allowed students to purchase surprise gifts for their families for \$25 each and this year raised \$400. We held a successful cookie dough fundraiser and had a food drive specifically to support our ITAT program. We hosted a Love Our Island poster contest, replaced the defibrillator pads in our AED and hold two free pancake breakfasts for all students.

With the absence of a full time librarian, the Home and School has taken on the task of organizing and hosting the Scholastic Book Fair with great success. This school year saw two book fairs, one in the fall and a second in March.

Rather than show our appreciation to the teachers and staff at QEES just during Teacher Appreciation Week, we have been doing smaller treats on a monthly basis throughout the school year. These small gestures were topped off after Christmas break when the staff came back to a freshly renovated staff lounge Home and School volunteers donated about 120 hours to repaint walls and cabinets, paint a mural on one wall and create a more relaxing space for the staff.

QEES Home and School is very lucky to have a fantastic relationship with our administrative and teaching staff, parents and caregivers, and the surrounding community. We have several very dedicated members that give freely of their time and energies to make QEES a warm, supportive school full of proud, bright, caring and kind students. We look forward to the remainder of this school year and those yet to come





1. Summary of Strategic Planning Exercise: With overcrowding concerns for our school, a growing and large international community, concerns about supportive resources for our growing French immersion program, inadequate "clean eating" food options for our lunch program and a non-existent breakfast program, and other important academic concerns, last year we carried out a strategic planning exercise to identify the key issues and priorities that resonate with our community. In point/topic form, the issues emerged as: (1) Capacity issues for existing schools; (2) Lack of enrichment opportunities; (3) Inadequate support for French Immersion; (4) More support and assistance for newcomers and our diverse community; (5) More natural and cultural experiences for our children; (6) Better nutritional options and healthy choices at school; (7) Increased mental health support; (8) More afterschool programs; (9) Well defined yearly goals for each grade with grade-level communication strategies (to ensure that all parents receive the same message); (10) Need more resources and staff to address curriculum issues/outcomes for both the English and French immersion programs.

2. Buddy Bench: A Buddy Bench was installed at Spring Park School, thanks to the great efforts of Laura Sinclair Bevan who was in charge of this project. The Buddy Bench was introduced to children at our Terry Fox Assembly. What is a Buddy Bench? Physically, it is just a nicely designed and well-decorated playground bench - but it represents much more than that The idea of the Buddy Bench is to eliminate loneliness and foster friendship on the playground. So, let's spread the message of inclusion and kindness! http://buddybench.org/



- 3. Committee Work and Community Engagement: In an effort to address some of the priorities identified above, our committees have carried out the following activities this year:
- (a) Health and Nutrition Committee: one focus for this committee is to improve the quality of food provided through our lunch programs and to educate our community on healthier choices for their children. To this end, a number of new healthy-eating lunch options were introduced this year, often replacing empty calories with nutritious options (such as fruits and vegetables). The greatest accomplishment that we had this year, however, was the introduction of a smoothie-based breakfast program offered once a week on Fridays at our school. This has been a huge success, where we are providing approximately 150 nutritious smoothies each Friday (due to the size of our school population, at ~540 kids, we offer smoothies to the grades K-2 and grades 3-6 on an alternating week basis); as well, we are providing some fun sports in the gym for the children of the breakfast-program volunteers. We will be taking advantage of the Wyman's donation of blueberries as we move forward on this breakfast program. We are also planning on serving grades K-6 for each Friday, if we can find suitable space in the school to do this
- (b) Canadian Parents for French (CPF): in an effort to enrich the French immersion experience at our school, our Home and School moved forward to create a local chapter of CPF at Spring Park School last year. This committee has been very active, recruiting many parents from our school to CPF and engaging our community. Following up on the success of last year, this committee has provided more exciting extra-curricular activities for our children, including a fun movie night (with popcorn and drinks), so that learning French can be extended out of the classroom and become part of their broader experience. We also had a Valentine's Day Door Decorating Contest where classes decorated their classroom doors with wonderful French-based decorations and language, where a total of 17 classes participated in the contest. Our two judges were Denis Duchesne (Radio Canada) and Deb O'Hanley (Carrefour de L'Ile St-Jean) they evaluated each one of the decorated doors. Six classes won pizza parties or money prizes. There will be some more activities happening shortly.



4. Diversity Awareness Week: In an effort to engage our parents, we followed up on last year's successful weeklong school event to celebrate our diverse community. Daily activities were conducted, including: (a) playing the national anthem from different countries: (b) parents visited classes to talk about their heritage/origin; (c) music and sports from different countries were showcased through the week; (d) heritage-tree charts were created by children with the assistance of parents; (e) information provided by children was used to update a magnificent map of the globe showing the birthplace or cultural/heritage locations where all of the children originate from; (f) Information fact sheets were constructed on China, France, Syria and Canada and were given to the Principal for the distribution to the teachers; and (g) We had special presentations: Bing, from China and has been living in Charlottetown for 10 years She is part of an Asian Cultural Artist Group on PEI and is also a dance instructor and choreographer. She performed two traditional dances for us, a vivid and lively Mongolian Dance performed for shepherds who tended the animals in the fields. Ali moved to PEI from Iran with his family in the summer of 2014. He runs a restaurant in town called Taste of Persia and he loves to share traditional Iranian music and his unique instruments with those around him. Ali plays the Taar and Setar.

<u>5. Fundraising Activities:</u> Many of the initiatives that have come out of our strategic planning exercise depend on fundraising activities in order to generate extra revenue. To this end, we have been developing the following fundraising activities:

- 1 Spooktacular Silent Auction and bake sale: For the first time, we ran a silent auction at our school's annual Halloween event, Spooktacular. This was a very successful event that benefited from starting as an online auction (and then being carried over as a live event). In this way, we were able to accelerate the bidding so as to fit within the timeframe of Spooktacular. As well, our H&S hosted our traditional bake sale to help support our teachers and their classrooms.
- 2 <u>Coupon books</u>: we sell coupon books, twice during the year, to raise money for the end of year school field trips
- 3. <u>Christmas Shoppe:</u> This is a wonderful annual event organized by our H&S where students have a chance to purchase Christmas gifts for their family. These gifts are provided as donations from our community and the funds raised went to help our new breakfast program and support our local CBC Turkey Drive.
- 4 <u>Canadian Parents for French</u>: In order to pursue a number of key French initiatives and activities as part of our Canadian Parents for French Committee/Chapter, the CPF have conducted the following activities in order to be "self-sustaining": 1 Sold popcorn and drinks at our French movie night; and (2) sold memberships for CPF (where a portion of the membership fees returns to our school's CPF Committee/Chapter

6. Teacher/Staff Appreciation Week: To show our gratitude for all that our teachers and staff do at Spring Park school, this year we again honored our teachers, staff, and bus drivers over a two-week period (due to snowstorm school cancellations) by showing our appreciation through small daily gestures, including: (a) creating a large "thank you" banner showcased at the front of the school; (b)

delivering thank you cards to our teachers and staff; (c) bringing flower bouquets to the front office and

7. Proposed Policy Resolutions: We recently submitted a school policy resolution to address the current status of the allotted times for lunch and snack in the Province. The major concerns that were addressed in these resolutions were: i e, Is the minimal 20 minutes lunch time being adhered to, or are children being rushed to eat their lunches – our resolution requests that this time frame be strictly enforced ii. That children should be going outside for recess first, before eating their lunch iii. That a minimal time of 10 minutes be allotted for children to eat their snacks, where, currently, this time frame is much shorter. It is essential that children have sufficient time to eat their lunches and snacks in order that they perform well in school - in the classroom, in the gym, and outdoors.

8. Public School Branch Proposed Changes: At the Spring Park Home and School meeting on Jan 17, 2017, we discussed our school's concerns with the proposed changes provided in the Category II Change Study Report for Charlottetown. In an effort to provide a unified voice from our school, an ad-hoc committee was created to address these proposed changes. The main task of this committee was to consolidate our concerns and provide critical feedback on the report, including amendments and clarifications. A response document was crafted:

PEI HOME AND SCHOOL FEDERATION PROPOSED RESOLUTIONS Annual Meeting, April 8, 2017

RESOLUTION 1-2017 SCHOOL COUNSELING SERVICES Submitted by the Englewood Home and School Association

- WHEREAS according to the Canadian Mental Health Association, 70% of adults with mental illness report that their symptoms first appeared in childhood and adolescence, and an estimated 10-20% of Canadian youth are affected by mental illness or disorders; and
- WHEREAS the most common mental health disorders affecting children anxiety and depression,
 Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and eating disorders affect students'
 quality of life and the ability to benefit from their school experience; and
- whereas research has shown that early intervention, diagnosis and treatment of mental health disorders can reduce negative outcomes and allow children to develop the resilience needed to cope with life's difficulties. Without early intervention, the potential results of mental illness serious impairment, substance abuse, unemployment, homelessness, poverty and suicide can be costly to the individual and society; and
- WHEREAS one of five interconnected strategic priorities in PEI's new Mental Health and Addiction Strategy is "Invest early focus on children, young people and families"; and
- WHEREAS school counsellors may be the only resource available to students and their families in rural communities and are often the first point of contact in identifying problems that need immediate or more intense treatment; and
- WHEREAS the current allotment of school counselors in Prince Edward Island schools (1 per 400 students) is insufficient to address the mental health needs of Prince Edward Island school children. School counsellors are forced to be reactive rather than delivering programs aimed at preventing mental health issues and building resilience; and
- whereas counsellors in PEI schools can spend as little as two days per week in a school, making it difficult to establish familiarity with the student body and develop relationships needed for success. Teachers, administrators and staff deal with students' mental health needs on days when school counselors are not present. This places additional stress on the teachers who lack the time and training to deal with serious issues of mental health and puts the child at risk if imminent problems are unaddressed; and

WHEREAS mental health needs of students has been a topic of discussion in meetings of the newly established PEI District Advisory Councils; and

WHEREAS the Province just signed a new Health Accord with the Federal Government in which 20.5 million is allocated for mental health initiatives over 10 years; and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation request the Minister of Education and Early Childhood Development and the Minister of Health and Wellness improve access to counseling services in Prince Edward Island schools, with an emphasis on providing proactive programs to support children and youth mental health and wellness in schools and communities; and

PEI Home and School Federation School Food Guiding Principles (DRAFT)

The **PEI Home and School Federation** is the umbrella organization of local "Home and School" and "parent council" organizations in 55 schools across Prince Edward Island.

We bring together parents, guardians, teachers, administrators and staff to promote the total well-being of children and the highest standards of education for each child in the province

The Prince Edward Island provincial school food strategy will be a model for how all stakeholders in education can be brought together to promote their shared values for the benefit and wellbeing of all Island children.

The strategy will be developed and nurtured through a collaboration of students, parents and guardians, government departments, primary industries, cooks and chefs. The following principles will guide the implementation of the strategy.

1. We will create school environments that make healthy choices easiest for students.

Good food and authentic hospitality nurture the whole child and invite collaboration and success. We will create inviting and safe environments within schools and provide enough time for eating, discussion, sharing and learning around food. We will offer opportunities for students to open up to new, shared food experiences and local food possibilities

2. We will create school food programs that are universal, inclusive and equitable.

We will provide adequate, nutritious food to all school-aged children in Prince Edward Island, regardless

of their ability to pay, the availability of resources in the community, or the location of the school. We will ensure that hunger is not a barrier to learning for any child. We will serve a variety of foods in recognition of the diversity of the student population and we will create an environment of respect for every person's inherent value and celebrate their potential to contribute to their school and community

3. Young people will be given opportunities to drive the school food programs.

We will make schools a hub for food activity and emphasize developing the capacity of young people to advocate for their own needs. We will provide students with regular opportunities to collaborate with students from other Island schools.

4 We will provide opportunities for curriculum integration.

We will provide opportunities for hands on learning, service learning, citizenship and community projects, social entrepreneurship and articulation agreements with post-secondary institutions. Integration with the curriculum will allow students to prepare and grow food, make healthy choices outside school, think critically about the food system and media, and develop self-awareness and confidence.

5. We will work with local farmers, fishers and processors to emphasize the value of fresh, local, sustainable, seasonal food.

We will engage grassroots stakeholders and respect the assets and resources already available in schools and communities. We will place a high emphasis on local, seasonal food and we will aim for sustainability by building support and capacity at the community level.

6. We will secure additional funding and resources to ensure that programs are properly staffed and funded to be sustainable and create significant impact.

Volunteers are valued in schools, but sustainable funding and dedicated staff are vital. The provincial school food strategy will not be an added responsibility for school staff and volunteers. We will implement pilot projects that will aid in developing processes that clarify expectations for schools and school staff.

7. We will set achievable goals with clear targets and timelines to measure success.

Achievable goals will be set and progress toward these goals will be monitored. Evaluation measures will include indicators relating to, but not limited to, the availability of healthy food in schools, the wellbeing of students, food literacy, attendance and academic achievement, the cost of the program, amount of local food accessed by the school food program, the economic multiplier effect of local food procurement, and the time and resources required by school staff and volunteers Successes will be celebrated!

RESOLUTION 3- 2017 SCHOOL HEALTHY SNACK TIME Submitted by Spring Park Home and School Association

WHEREAS we know that making time for physical activity and nutrition in school does not detract from academics; it's an investment in higher academic performance, with studies showing that healthy kids get better grades, attend school more often and behave better in class, and

WHEREAS research on properly fueling your body supports the concept of consuming frequent healthy meals and snacks and drinking lots of water, five to seven times per day, as the best way to enhance cognitive performance and keep blood sugar levels constant, and

WHEREAS recognizing that students should have a nourishing snack and water every three to four hours, students would benefit from a 10 minute healthy snack time separate from recess to boost energy and facilitate learning;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation requests the Public Schools Branch to develop policy for the purpose of implementing a 10 minute healthy snack time apart from recess in all schools in Prince Edward Island to contribute to overall student health and learning.

RESOLUTION 4-2017 SCHOOL LUNCH TIME FRAME Submitted by Spring Park Home and School Association

WHEREAS according to Statistics Canada, in 2011ⁱ, approximately one third of Canadian children between the ages of 5 and 17 were obese and given the amount of time children spend in school, we must recognize the school setting is one that significantly influences students' food choices and intakes and, consequently, affects their overall health and weight, and

WHEREAS healthy food choices and practices have been linked with learning readiness and academic success, as well as fewer discipline and emotional problems ii, and

WHEREAS a study out of Harvard ⁱⁱⁱ found that when children had a school lunch period of less than 20 minutes, they consumed less of their entrees, vegetables and milk, and they were less likely to choose a fruit to go with their meal, and

WHEREAS the PEI Public Schools Branch states in their School Nutrition Policy
2.4.1 a) Schools SHALL allow a minimum of 20 minutes for students to eat lunch iv
(Note: This should not include time to stand in line, travel to lunch areas, or prepare foods), and

WHEREAS the PEI Public Schools Branch also states in their School Nutrition Policy 2.4.1 b) In the elementary setting, encourage that foods are eaten after outside play, whenever possible and 2.4.1 c) Assure that lunch is eaten in a calm positive environment iv;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation requests the Public Schools Branch to strictly enforce its policy of a minimum 20-minute school lunch eating time for all students keeping in mind that this is eating time only; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the PEI Home and School Federation requests the Public Schools Branch to ensure that elementary students will eat their lunch after outside play, whenever possible, in a calm and positive environment to facilitate healthy eating in a relaxed atmosphere that is not distracted and hurried.

- Teacher-librarians help students develop a love of reading and life-long learning which is fundamental to their success as engaged citizens. They help students use digital technologies as well as print resources.
- Teacher-librarians help students learn independently and provide expert advice in locating and using high quality information
- Teacher-librarians support classroom teachers with resources that enrich the curriculum and help support learners.
- An erosion of teacher-librarian positions in many schools across the province means many students do not have equitable access to library resources and the expertise of a teacher-librarian. This reality undermines access to resources for students and teachers and undermines opportunities to strengthen literacy across the K-12 system
- The development of lifelong learners is at risk when schools experience inequities based on geography, school size and in many cases, insufficient staffing allocation. If we are to be truly committed to equitable long term literacy, schools with teacher-librarians and libraries must play a pivotal role.

RESOLUTION 7-2017 INCREASE TO 5 PERIOD DAYS FOR HIGH SCHOOL BY DECREASING CLASS LENGTH TO 60 MINUTES

Submitted by Westisle Parent Council / Home and School Association

WHEREAS	an all around education includes opportunities to explore interests through elective courses and students that are able to do this would be better equipped to make informed choices for post-secondary education, and
WHEREAS	the number of mandated classes was increased in 2015 to include a grade 10 physical education class as well as a career exploration class and a creativity and innovation class, and

WHEREAS the current high school programming is a semestered system with four 75 minute classes per day for 2 semesters to give a total of 24 credits over 3 years, 20 of which are needed for graduation with 12 that are mandatory, and students pursuing certain programs like advanced sciences and French immersion have little room for elective courses over the three years, and

WHEREAS it is felt that 75 minute periods are too long to keep students engaged and productive, and

WHEREAS the French School Board has already implemented a 5 period/day semestered system and have adjusted curriculum and graduation requirements accordingly, and

WHEREAS the Department of Education is stressing career planning by making the Career Explorations course mandatory for high school students, it has decreased the opportunity for students to explore through other elective courses i.e. music, foods, computer science;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the PEIHSF request that the Department of Education, Early Learning and Culture review its current semestered system and consider switching to a five period day of 60 minute classes and adjust curriculum and graduation requirements accordingly.

Thank you for your letter regarding the Resolutions passed at your April 9th Annual General Meeting. First, let me thank you for giving me the opportunity to attend and speak to your membership. As you know, I strongly believe that engaged parents make a significant contribution to learning.

With regards to the resolutions, I am pleased to provide the following responses:

RESOLUTION 1 - 2016 - Social Media Policy

The province of Prince Edward Island has initiated a social media policy for all of its departments and education authorities which is presently under review

RESOLUTION 2 - Teaching Profession Act

The Education Act includes sections that pertain to the teaching profession in the area of Responsibilities of Principals and Responsibilities of Teachers. As well, the following regulations stipulates requirements regarding: Instructional Personnel Regulations, Teacher Discipline Regulations, as well as the Certification and Standards Regulations which deals with certification of teachers for the province of PEI

RESOLUTION 3 – 2016 – Public Reporting and Removal of School Fees

The Public School Branch (PSB) is in the process of merging Western School Board Policy 33 and ESD policy CFA-R on School Fund-raising Administration and Accounting Procedures. The Director will consult with school principals and school communities to determine the best manner to convey the fee structure. Once the consultation process is complete, the PSB Board of Directors who will direct the PSB on implementing any recommendations.

RESOLUTION 4 – 2016 – French Immersion

- The Department works closely with the Human Resources staff of the Public Schools Branch to assess their staffing needs and if necessary, to recruit French teachers off Island. In 2015-2016, the Department has provided financial support to the Board for recruitment efforts in Nova Scotia and Moncton. The Department also works closely with UPEI to support the French B. Ed. The Bachelor of Education in French at UPEI receives \$380,000 annually to support the delivery of the program. A joint funding agreement between the provincial and federal governments is in place until 2017-2018. Twelve students graduated from the program in 2016 and 16 are now registered for 2016-2017. Many of these students are hired to teach in our schools.
- 2. There are no specific initiatives that address the concern of French substitute teachers and EAs. However, French language is certainly an asset that is prominent in the database used to search for substitutes.
- A minimum of \$200,000 of learning resources is annually put into our French Second Language programs Schools that have seen large increases in the number of students can always apply for extra funding for school and classroom libraries
- The Department provides bursaries for teachers wishing to further their study in French (\$7000 in 2015-16). It also provides individual French language coaching for up to ten teachers a year through the Programme de Perfectionnement Languagier (\$16 000 in 2015-16). The Department also provides bursaries for French Second Language teachers to attend out-of-province Professional learning sessions in French (2015-16, \$6000).

RESOLUTION 5 – 2016 - Automated External Defibrillators

Some schools have purchased these devices on their own and training by qualified personnel has been offered to individual school staff if they have purchased the equipment. The board has not initiated a program to purchase devices for schools. It is estimated that a board wide initiative would cost in excess of \$100K. Currently, the board would not be able to finance this expenditure for all schools. However, funding is provided to the Public Schools Branch if there are special circumstances that arise for individual students

I look forward to further conversations on educational matters
